

Bureaucrat Defined By Biddle; Bricker Speaks in Montana

 Declarations by republicans that what they term "the new deal bureaucracy" is strangling people's rights have drawn a reply from Attorney General Biddle defining a bureaucrat as "a man who holds a job in public life that a republican would like to have."

Yesterday Gov. John W. Bricker, the republican vice presidential nominee, told a Montana crowd that the federal government now is marked by disorder and confusion. He added:

"The dead hand of bureaucracy must be taken off the neck of the people."

Biddle supplied his definition of a bureaucrat to a meeting of the New Jersey State Federation of Labor at Atlantic City. He said "communism is perhaps the biggest red herring smeared across the political trail, but there are other red herrings too—a favorite republican war cry—a bureaucrat."

Bricker traveled on into Washington state today, for speeches at Spokane and Wenatchee, after a speech last night in Great Falls, Mont., where he said President Roosevelt had exhibited "violent antagonism to veterans' legislation."

Today also brought the funeral of Wendell L. Willkie, 1940 republican presidential nominee,

to be attended by the 1944 choice, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, in New York City.

Publication of a pamphlet, "An American Program" by Simon and Schuster, Inc., showed that its foreword was an appeal by Mr. Willkie for the voters to demand that candidates make meaningful statements on our international obligations and our attitude on racial minorities.

There are signs that his death may intensify both republican and democratic efforts to cultivate the independent vote. Both sides agreed that much of the Willkie following was in this category.

Senator Hill (D-Ala.) told Washington reporters that the fact that Willkie did not announce for Dewey "might make his followers feel that he was against Dewey and that they accordingly should support Roosevelt."

Senator Willis (R-Ind.) told these reporters, however, that Willkie might have had some influence on the election had he lived but that his death, if it benefited either party, probably would help Dewey "a shade" by removing the threat of a possible party bolt.

Dewey declined to comment on Secretary of State Hull's reaction to reports in the New York Times, Herald Tribune and Daily News that there are indications Dewey, if elected, would ask Hull to stay on with the new administration. His aides had called the reports "purely speculative." Hull said:

"My support and loyalty belong primarily to the government and its present official head, President Roosevelt. This will continue to be my attitude."

Hearings Set

In Chicago, the house committee investigating campaign expenditures received reports showing \$89,342 was donated to the anti-Roosevelt American democratic national committee. The committee decided to subpoena three officials, members saying that in several instances the records did not show donor names. Tomorrow, the investigators are to begin hearings in Dallas, Tex.

Sidney Hillman, chairman of the CIO political action committee, said in a Cleveland, Ohio, address that "the republican old guard chose Thomas Dewey" because "his record was so bad that it could not be defended by anyone who remembered it." This, Hillman said, "meant nominating a man who could not remember what had happened and who could remember what had never happened."

ALDO BELLOTTI HURT IN FRANCE

Official notification that their son, Pvt. Aldo A. Bellotti, U. S. army infantry, was wounded in action in France, was received here for publication Monday by Mr. and Mrs. Victor Bellotti, Pelican Bay. The youth, who played basketball under Wayne Scott at KUHS, is now recovering satisfactorily at a hospital in England from 13 shrapnel wounds, a broken jaw and other serious injuries. He writes that he will probably remain in the hospital for at least another two months.

Pvt. Bellotti was wounded July 13, going into France just a month after D-Day. His father has been with DiGiorgio Fruit corporation since 1921. Pvt. Bellotti has three sisters, Mary, Lena, Lena (Mrs. Joseph Derah), two brothers, Fernando, who is with the U. S. army engineers at New Orleans, and Joe, now serving as mechanic with the U. S. army air corps at Saipan. Joe is also a former KUHS basketball player.

Prior to entering the service, Pvt. Bellotti was employed on the shipping dock at Pelican Bay Lumber company.

Ford Originated Idea For 'Bundles'

SPOKANE, Oct. 10 (AP)—The idea for the "bundles for congress" drive originated not with Joseph A. Albi but with James A. Ford, managing secretary of the Spokane chamber of commerce, the latter testified yesterday in Albi's \$250,000 libel action against the American News company and its Spokane agent.

BOARD FIGHTS SPECIAL TAX LEVIES HERE

Klamath Falls Realty board today declared against any further special tax levies or bond issues "unless there is a real emergency."

The board made no mention of particular levies it opposes, but announced its blanket opposition. Here is the resolution:

"Whereas, the tax rate for the city of Klamath Falls for the current year is 81.2 mills, which is the highest for any city in the state of Oregon, and much higher than the average, and

"Whereas, this condition is a serious handicap to the sale of homes and other real property, causing many persons to locate outside the city or elsewhere; therefore be it

"Resolved, that, until the millage rate has been substantially reduced, the various budgeting bodies, and the citizens of Klamath Falls, be urged to vote 'No' on all special levies and bond issues, unless there is a real emergency. Be it also

"Resolved, that this resolution be made a part of the minutes of the Klamath Realty board, that a copy be given the daily press, and that copies be mailed to the Klamath county court, the mayor and council of the city of Klamath Falls, Union high school district No. 1, and school district No. 1.
