ST. LOUIS, Oct. 10 (AP)—The best team in baseball won the World Series and that's as it should be.

Superb strikeout pitching and perfect infield play by the St. Louis Cardinals with an occasional flash of power cooled off the Browns' hot streak and left them a beaten ball club, losers 4 to 2 in games after a tough uphill struggle in a six-tilt battle at Sportsmans park.

Overshadowed by the total of 92 third-strike victims that swept all series records off the books was the routine destruction of American league rallies engineered by Marty Marion and other Cardinal infielders who supplement "Mr. Shortstop."

The Red Bird quartet handled 124 chances without a boot while the Brownie inner circle bobbled seven of 126 tries.


