Fighting Irish Favored To Beat Dartmouth Eleven; Purdue Over Iowa Seahawks

CHICAGO, Oct. 12 (AP)—With the courage that Columbus day should give all intrepid navigators, your scribe steers the following course in Saturday's gridiron seas:

Ohio state 21, Wisconsin 12—that seasoned buckeye line, plus Les Horvath and some fancy-stepping backs, will hand the uprising badgers their first setback. Earl (Jug) Girard is a great passer, but Bill Willis, Gordon Appleby and Jack Dugger will harass him into inefficiency.

Notre Dame 26, Dartmouth 6—The Irish are rolling and should make it in a row with little trouble. Notre Dame's unswerving line might even fashion a third straight shut-out for the South Benders.

Michigan 19, Northwestern 7—The Wolverines regained poise in trimming Minnesota and will man-handle the meekly purring Wildcats, who have been beaten twice in a row. Bob Wiese and Bob Nuss Baumer are much more than Northwestern can match on the ground.

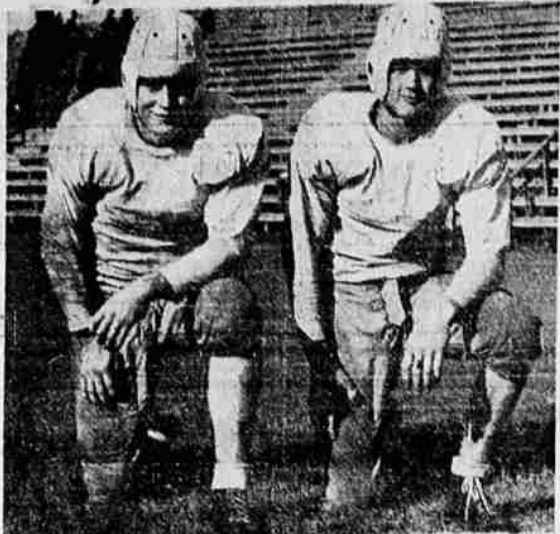

Illinois 30, Iowa 0—Even without injured Eddie Bray, the Illini should run wild against the talent-shy Hawkeyes. It may be a red letter day for sprinter Claude (Buddy) Young, who'll see considerable action in Bray's absence.

Indiana 35, Nebraska 0—The Hoosiers, aided by a two-week rest, get an easy workout before resuming Big Ten activities. Bob Hoernschemeyer now has had enough time to perform up to his brilliant 1943 form.

Minnesota 25, Missouri 0—The Gophers should bounce back after the lacing by Michigan. The Tigers routed Kansas State

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12 (AP)—No less than eleven of Oregon's undefeated and untied prep grid-iron teams place their flawless records on the block this weekend against opposition ranging from tough to mediocre.

Major inter-district clash will send Bend's Lava Bears, unopposed in four tilts, to Eugene to face the once-beaten but potent Axemen, who won twice before dropping a 19 to 6 verdict to North Bend last week.

Over in district 1, LaGrande's Blue Mountain league leaders, winners of four straight, will journey to Pendleton to meet the

loop cellarites. Other district 1 and Blue Mountain League clubs will engage Washington elevens, Mac high of Milton-Freewater entertaining Clarkston and Baker playing host to Walla Walla.

In the southern Oregon conference, Grants Pass, still seeking its first victory, travels to Klamath Falls, surprisingly held to a tie by Ashland last week. High-scoring Medford, unlicked in three starts, is idle. Myrtle Point travels to Marshfield for a Coos County league fracas. Both games count in the district 2 race.
