MYER DENOUNCES ANTI-JAP FEELING

war over here," Myer replied. "They're going to be particular about what liberties are taken with our constitution."

Garrett continued:

Infant Problem

"What we want is to see fighting the Japanese later. We feel we should dispense with the Japanese now, while the problem is in its infancy."

"That is the point of view of people who refuse to accept the constitution of the United States, which guarantees equal rights to all colors and creeds," Myer said. "I understand your organization advocates taking their citizenship away from these people. When they do that, they are monkeying with our citizenship and mine, and I don't care for that."

"Not Afraid"

"I'm not afraid of rejecting their citizenship," Garrett replied.

Myer said he believed the source of friction was largely economic, and that competition offered by the Japanese was feared. He said some people "forget we have some 12,000 Japanese-Americans fighting with our armies and that in one relocation center recently we had 4 gold star mothers whose sons had been killed in action."

Myer is conducting conferences with area supervisors over the country.

Dillon Myer, National WRA Director, Paid Brief Visit to Klamath Falls Wednesday Following an Official Inspection of the Tulelake Center.

Myer would make no public comment on future determination of Japanese-American questions except to say that the sooner the WRA's job is finished, the better he will like it. He said he found things working smoothly at Tulelake, and expressed his confidence in Director R. R. Best.

He said he had no personal ideas about the use of the Tulelake center property once it is abandoned as a relocation center. He said he presumed it would be disposed of as "surplus" property like many other wartime installations.

In the south, the Moscow radio said, other Russians broke into Debrecen, third largest Hungarian city of 122,517, on the Orient railroad 116 miles east of menaced Budapest. The Germans said their tanks had thrown a 20-mile-wide ring around strong soviet armored forces in this area and had bent back relief columns moving up from Oradea, in Romania, and Karag, in Hungary. The German communique acknowledged the loss of Cluj, capital of Transylvania.

Resistance Grows

In central Italy, American and British forces of the fifth army met increasing enemy resistance in their attempt to break through the last of the Apennine hills into the Po valley, allied headquarters announced.

Other significant gains in yesterday's fighting came on the eighth army front where British troops captured Longiano, 12 miles west of Rimini, and the neighboring village of Lacrocetta. The eighth army also pushed additional forces across the Fiumicino river and occupied the towns of Gatteo and San Giovanni.

on Peleliu. Sunday's communique, reporting 11,083 dead on that main island, was 1000 too high at that time, the admiral said. He disclosed that 184 Japanese civilians had been interned on Angaur island, six miles southward of Peleliu.

Central Pacific planes bombed Babelthup, largest of the Palau islands, and hit shipping at Iwo Jima, in the Volcano group. Two of eight Nipponese interceptors were shot down there.

Southwest Pacific fighters sank six barges which the Japanese were attempting to sneak into Morotal, advance American base 300 miles south of the Philippines.
