

GHT LOOMS BETWEEN CIO, AFL Factions

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (P)—
AFL and the CIO, leaders
in the war labor
movement, are
decided to give Presi-
dent Roosevelt no recom-
mendations on easing wage controls,
start swinging at each
other again before the year is

out.

mity of the AFL and CIO mem-

They feel no sympathy

differentials between the
northwest and the south-
western industries, the war
board yesterday declared
differentials were based on
economic factors and could
not be eliminated under the
rule of wages stabilization.

timber and milling companies
