**Mrs. McPherson's Will to Be Filed**

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13 (AP)—The will of Aimee Semple McPherson, disposing of personal property estimated by her attorney to be worth less than \$10,000, probably will be filed today. Simultaneously, the evangelist's daughter, Mrs. Roberta Salter, said she had no intention of contesting provisions of the will. Joseph Fajner, attorney for the founder of Angelus Temple and the Foursquare gospel, said the will "mentions only blood relations; no strangers or others are mentioned." He added it made no provision for Mrs. McPherson's succession as head of her denomination by her son, Rev. Rolf McPherson, who had been so designated before her death in Oakland, Calif., September 27.
