GORDON LEAVES FOR LAKEVIEW

U. S. Senator Guy Gordon left for Lakeview Sunday after a day and a half spent in Klamath Falls meeting citizens and advancing his campaign for election at the November balloting. Gordon spoke at a meeting Saturday night at the Legion hall, discussing especially legislation designed to aid veterans returning from the war. He outlined the "GI Bill of Rights" as a framework for proper government aid to veterans, and emphasized the importance of a local service officer or agency to help individual veterans to take advantage of legislation passed in their behalf.

L. L. Lombard, president of the local veterans club supporting Gordon's candidacy, introduced the senator.

Gordon said he is receiving encouraging evidence of support throughout the state. He was appointed to the senate by Governor Earl Snell to fill the vacancy created by the death of Senator C. L. McNary. His opponent in the November election is Willis Mahoney.
