**ROTARY HEARS DISCUSSION ON SUPPORT FUND**

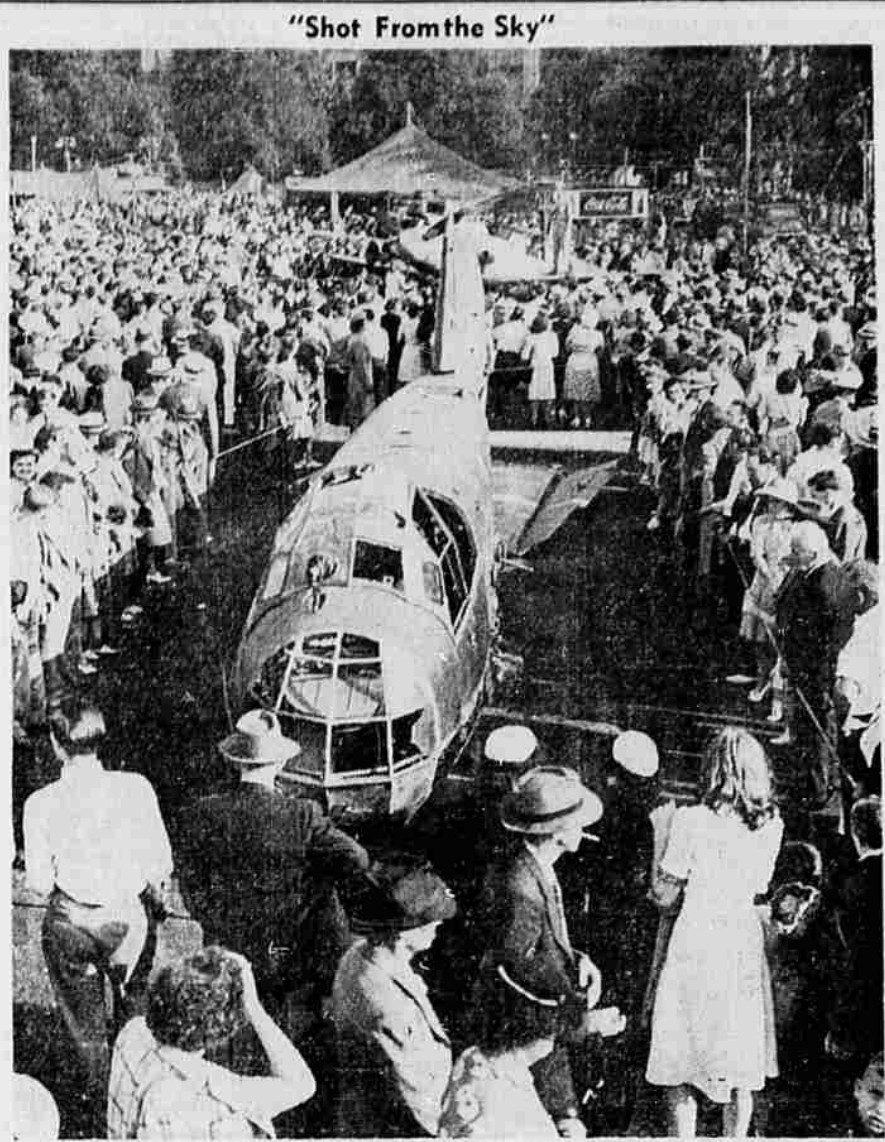
Organized teachers' "state school support fund" constitutional amendment on the November 7 election ballot, while appearing to be a mild 55 cents per day of school attendance, actually involves \$13,295,448, of which \$6,295,448 must be raised from new tax sources, F. H. Young, Portland, manager of Oregon Business and Tax Research Inc., told Rotary club members at lunch Friday.

The speaker said there are only three sources from which to raise the \$6,295,448, higher personal income tax rates, new types of taxes or as a state levy on property. Young explained that when state income tax revenue falls back to pre-war level of about \$6,000,000 annually, that amount will not even cancel levies on property for general state purposes, let alone pay the \$13,295,448 total cost of the teachers' 1944 constitutional amendment. High post-war levies on real estate that might reach 20 mills, will create widespread tax delinquencies, impair property values, and embarrass counties by forcing them to get along on reduced income when they remit to the state 100 per cent of the state tax collected by counties.

If schools want a large increase of money from state sources, they must expect to submit to increased state control over local education, Young contended.

National Education association figures were quoted that showed only nine states which spent more taxes per pupil in 1941-42 school year than did Oregon, and that only seven states had a higher general level of teacher salaries during 1943-44 than were paid in Oregon.

The 3 per cent gross income tax provided under the Townsend pension plan will require monthly tax reports by every wage earner, farmer, property owner, and substantially reduce income from Klamath county agriculture, Young told the Rotarians. He said that comparison of the proposed Townsend plan

in Oregon with the Hawaiian gross income tax was misleading because the islands use the tax for sole government support, not for pensions, and the rate is very much less than the

possible 3 per cent to 5 per cent Oregon Townsend tax, which will decrease wages, increase prices, ruin land values, stop sale of real property and that the Townsend tax is levied on gross receipts, irrespective of losses and without deductions of any kind.
