

# Foreign Policy Hot Issue of Campaign, FDR Adds Major Talk

President Roosevelt has decided to carry his campaign for a fourth term to Chicago as the political air continued turbulent over the issue of foreign policy.

White House Press Secretary Stephen Early told reporters today Mr. Roosevelt would deliver a major address in the windy city sometime after his Friday appearance in Philadelphia's Shibe park. Early said he did not have the date, but Mayor Kelly of Chicago last week announced a democratic rally in sprawling Soldier field there Saturday night.

There was no immediate definite word on any other presidential speeches.

**Plug Foreign Policy**

Roosevelt supporters, with Senator Ball (R-Minn.), in their ranks, plugged the foreign policy issue hard today, while Governor Dewey set out to expound on the same hot dispute tonight in Ball's home state.

The republican presidential nominee, who will speak from Minneapolis at 7:30 p. m. PWT (NBC and Blue networks) said in advance that he will "fill in the gaps" of President Roosevelt's New York address on America's part in the peacetime world.

Awaiting Dewey in Minneapolis was a challenge from Senator Harry Truman, democratic vice presidential candidate. Truman said in a statement there last night that if Dewey sincerely favors "a strong foreign policy," he will ask for defeat "of the eight isolationists who were nominated by the republicans" for the senate.

**McCormick Hits Back**

Publisher Robert R. McCormick, whose Chicago Tribune was listed by President Roose-

velt as part of "the isolationist press," commented that "the word isolationist is the word that a man controlled by foreign influences uses for patriot."

Senator Ball, bolting his party's nominee to support Mr. Roosevelt on foreign policy grounds, is to make a radio speech expanding his reasons, Thursday night.

The fact that it is to be sponsored by a Republican for Roosevelt committee headed by Bartley Crum, California manager for Wendell L. Willkie in 1940, inspired democrats to look around for more possible recruits from among the ranks of Stassen-Willkie republicans. Ball backed Stassen for the nomination Dewey won.

**Stassen Ashamed**

However, Victor A. Johnston of Minneapolis, who directed Stassen's campaign last spring, told reporters at Madison, Wis., today that "I know of my personal knowledge that Senator Ball does not represent the views of Harold E. Stassen, and I am sure that Commander Stassen, now serving in the South Pacific, must be heartily ashamed of him."

To the republican assertions that the administration is trying to cover up Pearl Harbor facts until after the election was added today in a statement by Rep. Engel (R-Mich.) at Washington that President Roosevelt "deliberately withheld" from congress information on German air power in 1937.

Engel said that "while President Roosevelt had insistent warnings of grave potentialities of German war strength" he held down requests for military appropriations "and now blames congress."

**"FDR Knows Way"**

The argument that once wars start they "do not wait for a new commander-in-chief to learn something of his duties" was advanced by Postmaster General Walker. He told a Cleveland party rally that Mr. Roosevelt knows the way to victory and a lasting peace.

But from Governor John W. Bricker of Ohio, No. 2 man on the republican ticket, came assertions that the president follows a "consistent pattern of contradictions." It will be a relief for the people, Bricker said at Denver, "to listen to a man who does not talk in terms of expediency."

Another home front dispute started when Republican Chairman Brownell said in a statement at New York that Senator Truman "gave his blessing to Hal Styles. . . whose admission that he was formerly a leader of the Ku Klux Klan has been printed extensively in California newspapers."

Styles is the democratic congressional nominee for California's 15th district. His secretary issued a statement in his name saying that "I did join the Ku Klux Klan 18 years ago. In 1930 I wrote a series of articles in the New York Graphic exposing the Klan and holding it up to public condemnation. In thus rendering a public service, it seems to me I should be highly commended for my courage."

**FINSLEY MOVES**

SALEM, Oct. 24 (P)—Fred Finsley, who resigned as state parole director last January 10 to become Wheeler county district attorney, announced here yesterday that he is moving to San Francisco to work for the National Probation association. Finsley's territory will include the 11 western states.
