LEGION HEADS SLATE MEETING IN KLAMATH

Penn C. Crum of Hood River, department commander of the American Legion, accompanied by Fritz Nissen, department adjutant; J. W. Valiant, national field secretary, and Bob Dillard, department service officer, arrived in the city last night on the second leg of a statewide coverage of Legion posts in the interests of the Legion program and particularly that part dealing with the rights and benefits to returned veterans. They were met by Post Commander Carl Schubert and other local officers who had arranged a full program for today.

Commander Crum has announced "service" as his prime objective for the year and has made known the readiness of the American Legion to assume its full obligation to the returned veteran as the agency best fitted by knowledge and experience to handle all matters under the jurisdiction of the veterans' administration.

This includes pension claims, dependents' claims, insurance, hospitalization, a 110 cent a day, gratuity pay, irregular discharges, vocational training and the numerous other matters of which the public and the average veteran are not well informed.

Under the adopted plan in Oregon, selective service has the assignment to see that the veteran returns to his former job if it is available and he wants it. The U. S. employment service is charged with obtaining a job for him if his former work is not available under the law or he desires a change.

The unemployment compensation commission is to handle all matters pertaining to unemployment allowances.

"Our experiences in the past," said Commander Crum, "has proven that uninformed persons and agencies can do immeasurable harm through erroneous advice and information. Returned service men should be referred to the officials of veterans' organizations for information and service."

This morning Bob Dillard conferred with Ted Case on matters pertaining to his work and the connection it has with the department service office.

Commander Crum expressed indignation over the efforts of some Legion officials and members of the organization to engage in partisan political activities in the name of the organization. Such utterances, he stated, are entirely unauthorized and contrary to long established principal. They may speak as they wish as individuals, but not as officials or representatives of the American Legion.

The commander and his staff were the guests of the Lions club at the Marine Barracks Tuesday noon and following luncheon spoke to an assembled group of the veterans. They also visited the naval air station and tonight will go through the entire program with the members of Klamath post No. 8 and others who are not members but would care to attend.

A story of a Seabee named Luca, and his wallet. It's only a wallet, really—not very important, when you're thinking in global war and things like Luca's wallet was mighty important to him, and it caused quite a commotion on the railroad—long distance trains, and a man stumbling in the driving rain when he found it. It's a human story, and it's a true one.

It was a terrible night—raining hard and very cold—but Claude Lyon put on his raincoat, got in his car, and started out. At mile post 37 he got out of the car and started walking along the right of way, scanning every foot of it with his flashlight.

He walked more than a mile in the driving rain. He stumbled into four or five water-holes, got scratched in a briar patch, fell down a slippery clay embankment... but he found the wallet, and brought it back to his office.

When he opened the wallet, he found a hundred dollars in water-soaked paper money. More important, he found the precious snapshot of Luca Cavallo's wife and their baby, Gilda.

As Lyon put the money and picture near the stove to dry, the phone rang. It was Mrs. Florence Spencer, S.P. telephone operator at Watsonville Junction, calling for Luca Cavallo to see if his wallet had been found.

"Yes, I found it," Lyon answered. "Everything's in it—the money—the picture... What's that? He wants me to keep the money? Listen, Mrs. Spencer, you tell the sailor that if he wants to give any rewards, he can send that money home to his little daughter. As soon as the stuff is dry enough, I'm putting it all in an envelope and mailing it straight to him."

This story doesn't have much to do with Southern Pacific's part in the war effort. It simply shows that railroads are more than trains and tracks. Railroads are people like conductor Joe Olander, dispatcher Lloyd Lader, operator Ralph Sirope and assistant signal supervisor Claude Lyon. People who, no matter how busy they are, still have time to be thoughtful, and understanding, and human.
