1360 of her officers and men were rescued.

In addition to the fleet units sunk or damaged, the Japanese lost 150 planes.

The actions began Monday afternoon (U. S. time) and extended throughout Tuesday.

Nimitz said a strong force of land-based Japanese planes attacked one U. S. task group Monday and succeeded in seriously damaging the Princeton, which is the first American carrier lost since the Liscombe Bay went down in flames off the Marshall Islands in early December, 1943.

Besides the captain, 133 other officers and 1227 enlisted men were saved. The complement of the light (jeep) carrier is not listed but probably is around 1500.

Third Force

The Japanese—obviously attempting a surprise three-pronged attack which they hoped would catch Halsey's force concentrating on Japanese battleships and cruisers in the Sibuyan and Sulu seas—sent a third force from Formosa.

This group included at least three carriers. However, there was no indication in the "communique" that any Japanese carrier planes were launched against the third fleet which possibly achieved surprise instead in its crippling attack on the imperial navy ships.

It was from this carrier force that Adm. Marc A. Mitscher's planes sank "at least one large carrier and severely damaged two others."

Reports incomplete

Nimitz said reports of this carrier action south of Formosa yet are incomplete, indicating the third fleet may have inflicted additional severe damage upon the enemy.

Carrier search planes discovered two enemy forces heading eastward Monday through the Sibuyan and Sulu seas, ostensibly intending to bombard Gen. Douglas MacArthur's ground forces on Leyte Island.

One force consisted of three or four battleships, 10 cruisers and about 13 destroyers.

Repeated attacks by carrier aircraft indicate that every battleship was damaged by bombs, that at least one was torpedoed and one cruiser was torpedoed.

The second force was sighted southwest of Negros Island in the Sulu sea in the southwestern Philippines. It consisted of two battleships, one cruiser and four destroyers.

Both battleships were damaged by bombs and the light units were strafed.

which the Germans have long attacked our Murmansk supply convoys to Russia. Important Norwegian iron mines are located in the Kirkenes area.

THE Russians are advancing steadily in Hungary and Czechoslovakia, but reports of their operations there are scanty and incomplete.

The British are chasing the Germans northward OUT of Greece—and probably getting a lot of satisfaction out of avenging the defeat they suffered there when the Germans chased them out.

GETTING back to the Pacific, the dispatches tell us that on Leyte the Japs have been trying on us the INFILTRATION tactics they used so successfully on the British in the Malayan campaign, but are meeting with BLOODY FAILURE.

PORTLAND, Oct. 25 (AP)—The Portland superintendent of schools declared today that the article appearing in the school district publication urging passage of the state school support amendment did not violate the law.

Willard B. Spalding, answering criticism of S. Eugene Allen, chairman of the school board, declared rules prohibit the use of school facilities for partisan political activity. I do not understand them to prohibit the use of the 'school bulletin' to present the point of view of the administration to teachers on controversial issues of concern to education."

Underground Ready

A determined underground stands ready in Norway to aid in the liberation, and has quietly mobilized resources during German occupation. A powerful fifth column in Norway facilitated Germany's quick conquest of the mountainous nation, home of the original Quilting, but now patriots are ready to strike a blow for liberation.

Marshal Stalin in an order of the day announced the capture of Satu Mare, last Romanian city held by the Germans, and nearby Carei. Both are in Transylvania hard by the pre-war Hungarian frontier. Satu Mare a city of 15,708, was a strong fortress position between Russian armies in Czechoslovakia and those invading Romania and Hungary. Stalin said the victory completed the capture of northern Transylvania.

Of the 1109 absentee ballots, sent out not long ago by the county clerk's office to men and women in service, 672 have already been returned. County Clerk Mac K. Short announced today.

Civilians who have moved from their place of registration and who plan to vote by absentee ballot, should send in their applications to the county where they are registered, asking for a ballot immediately. Absentee ballots must have been filled out and be back to the county in which a voter is registered, five days before election.

Election day is November 7, just 13 days away.

Japs Report 11 Yank Ships Lost

Optimistic Tokyo radio reported today that 11 American and three Japanese warships were sunk in a great sea-air battle raging in Philippine waters.

Most Tokyo broadcasts placed the action east of the Philippines, but they apparently referred to the three-pronged naval air fighting to the west and north in which Adm. Chester W. Nimitz said the U. S. third fleet lost one carrier, sank a Japanese carrier and damaged two other enemy carriers, five or six battleships, a cruiser and several other warships.
