Four Regulars On Sidelines Tuesday From Bumps Received in Medford Tilt

The Klamath Pelicans held their first good workout Tuesday afternoon at Modoc field since the big tilt with Medford. The K-men ran through some of their scoring plays and seemed to have plenty of zipper in getting ready for the Eureka Loggers here Friday night.

Four of the Pelican regulars were on the sidelines, due to injuries and bumps received in the fray with the Black Tornado. Redkey and Perkins were out of

the backfield, and Henthorne and Abbey filed in at their positions. In the forward wall, Wirth and Mason were absent, while George Long was given an easy job in backing up the line on the second string squad to save him needless body contact. Coach Cook was blowing a fast whistle in the practice session to save the boys from possible injury.

Of the injured starters, all should be ready by game time Friday night, with the possible exception of Redkey. The freshman flash hurt his leg in the Medford contest and was relegated to crutches. . . . If he is unable to start the fracas, Bill Abbey will probably be in there at the right half slot. Abbey's hand seems to be in pretty fair shape, although it is still heavily bandaged. He would not be able to do any passing but Rollie Berry will take care of that department anyway.

Former Prep Grid Coaches Go to Town

Ohio High School Gridders Make Up Squad of Nation's Fourth Ranking Ball Team

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 25 (P)—Ohio high school boys plus a young fellow who, until 1941, was only an assistant high school coach, have produced the nation's fourth ranking college grid squad at Ohio State university.

And it's just a repetition of what happened three years ago. Back in 1940, a young man by the name of Paul E. Brown was coaching at Massillon (O.) high school. One of his assistants was Carroll Widdoes.

Suddenly, with the support of the Ohio High School Coaches association, Brown became head coach at Ohio State and brought Widdoes and his other assistants with him. It was one of the biggest jumps ever made by a coach but it took Brown just two seasons to produce a Big Ten and unofficial national champion.

Last year was a bad one because Ohio State was one of those schools which had to depend entirely on civilian talent. Then Brown went to the navy and Widdoes, who never before had been in full charge of a college team, took over.

His team—still all civilian—now has won four straight games, the latest a 26 to 6 tri-

Fighting Irish Rated Top Gridiron Eleven of Nation Thirteenth Straight Time

NEW YORK, Oct. 25 (P)—For the thirteenth consecutive time over a two-year period, the Notre Dame football team rates as the country's No. 1 eleven in The Associated Press poll, but this time the Irish margin is a mere eight points.

Loss of a single first place vote and its 10 points would have dropped Notre Dame into second place behind Army in one of the tightest ballot battles the nine-year-old poll ever has produced.

Notre Dame, unbeaten this season, garnered 40 first-place tickets and 917 points. Army, likewise unscathed, was tops on 30 votes and finished with 809 points to be followed by Randolph Field, with 23, and Ohio State's Civilians with 14. The Flyers collected 853 points to 790 for the Buckeyes. The foursome had identical positions last week.

Not since Ohio State finished on top in the final voting of 1942 has the Notre Dame domination of the country's football forces been challenged to such an extent.

The South Bend Ramblers were first a week ago with 60 designations as the country's best, compared to 22 for Randolph Field, 12 for Army and four for Ohio State.

Since then, however, Notre Dame spent a torrid afternoon

defeating Wisconsin, 28 to 13, while Randolph Field crushed Camp Polk, 67 to 0; Army handed Coast Guard with greater ease, 76 to 0; and Ohio State knocked off the mature Great Lakes outfit, 26 to 6.

Georgia Tech was squeezed by Navy, 17 to 15; Iowa Pre-Flight, Tulsa, Pennsylvania, North Carolina Pre-Flight and Purdue complete the first ten, Tulsa, bowl minded for the fourth straight year, and Penn tied for seventh place with 209 points.

The Oklahomans and Purdue are making their bows among the elite, taking places held down last week by Navy and Great Lakes. The loss to Georgia Tech tumbled the Middies to twelfth place while the Chicago Sailors skidded all the way to sixteenth.

The top western team was the Second Air Force with 52 points for 15th place. Washington with 14 points was 22nd with California 28th and Southern California 28th with 7 and 5 votes, respectively.

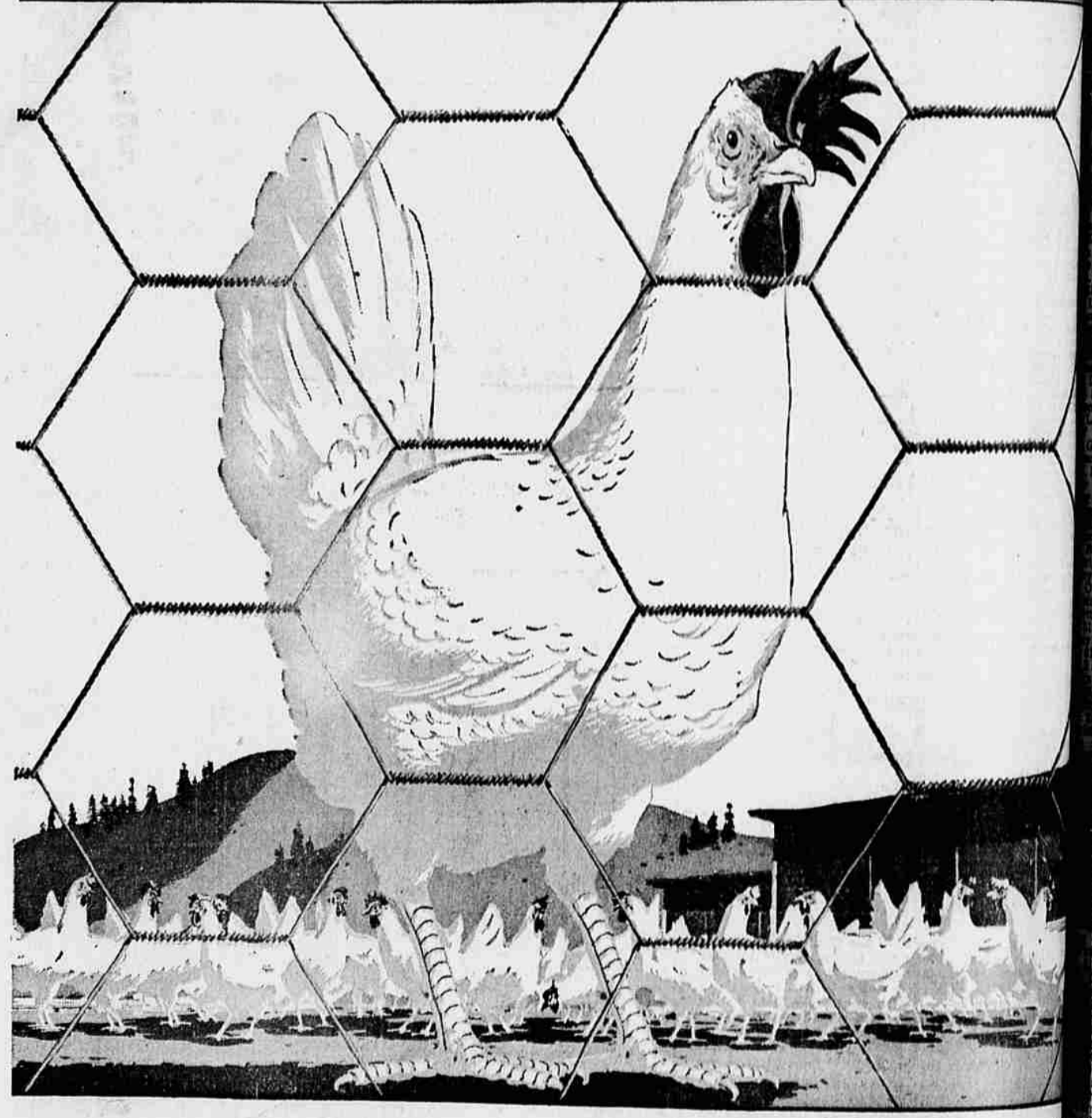
SUGAR FIGHTS FRIDAY
