

TAX PROBLEMS ISSUE, SAYS M. PETERSEN

Marius Petersen, candidate for 17th district state senator, today issued his campaign statement, discussing tax equalization, unemployment law revision, and other questions regarding state legislation.

Said Petersen:

"Being a candidate for senator from this district, it is my duty to give to you a statement as to who I am and what I stand for. I came to Klamath county in 1922. Before that time, I homesteaded in Montana and farmed in Nebraska for a number of years. I have, since 1927, operated Petersen and Johnson Brothers Lumber company at Lakeview, Ore., until it was destroyed by fire in 1942. I now operate a 160-acre farm close to Klamath Falls.

"I think I know the needs of this district, as I am thoroughly familiar with the situation confronting its people. I stand for revision of our present tax laws to such an extent that all property will be assessed on an equal basis where preference is shown to no one. At the present time, timber is assessed at only 10 per cent of its value, where other commodities are on the tax roll at about 40 per cent. This is not fair and should be remedied.

"For example, the county assessor of Lake county has made several trips this spring to Salem, asking the tax commission to increase the value of timber and each time has been refused. He told me that if he had asked for an increase on the value of cows, he was certain there would have been no objection. I believe that the tax commission should be abolished and values on all commodities should be allowed to be established by the assessor of each county.

"I believe in preserving our payrolls and our small sawmills and I am sure we can do so if all timber be cut on what is called a 'sustained yield' and it is unfair to the community and the small operator to have the so-called land exchange for timber. Not only do the counties lose the tax on this cut-over land but it also gives the national timber to the fellow that has got the land to exchange for timber. I think we have the remedy for that by simply passing a bill in the legislature by which this land cannot be taken off the tax roll.

"I also stand for revision of our unemployment bill. Why was this bill made with all the clauses contained therein—for example, experience and seasonality rating? Why were not all the operators put on the same rate? Why does one operator have to pay 4.7 per cent of the payroll and the other one pay 2.7? Let's all have the same rate and cut out the humbug.

"I believe in a fair old-age pension. When a man or woman has done their life's work and become old, regardless of what they have done with their earnings, their work and labor and what they have accomplished is here for the benefit of society and society should provide a comfortable and happy life for them in their elderly days.

"I stand for the fullest cooperation between the state and our returned veterans and their dependents and I will do everything in my power to see that they get everything they need and that they are properly taken care of for all time to come. They deserve that, and it is up to us to see that they get it.

"You may be assured that, if elected, I will faithfully and honestly serve you to the very best of my ability.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 26 (CP)—Worth Lowery, international president of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) yesterday asked expulsion of three union members on the grounds of their alleged affiliation with the U. S. communist political committee.

The men are Gordon B. Moir, Aberdeen; Ralph Nelson, Everett, and William Wallace, Bellingham.

Lowery asked expulsion on the grounds the IWA constitution forbids union members to join the communist group.

Supporters of the trio claimed at a union convention that that constitutional clause does not refer to the communist political committee but to membership in the party proper.

Infantile Paralysis Cases Decrease

PORTLAND, Oct. 26 (AP)—The 1944 infantile paralysis rate in Oregon—146 cases so far—is well below the 241 cases reported in 1943, the state board of health said today.

Communicable disease increased 20 per cent last week, the board reported, with venereal disease accounting for nearly half the total of 23 cases.

The board reported heart disease the cause of 264 of Oregon's 993 deaths in August. Cancer and tumors were the next most fatal ailments, causing 151 deaths. Accidents caused 82 fatalities.
