GERMANS HIT BRITISH LINE AROUND VENLO

Wall of Fire, Steel Meets Desperate Relief Blow

LONDON, Oct. 27 (AP)—Field Marshal Gen. von Model's Germans leaped into a counterattack along a 10-mile front against the eastern side of the British salient in Holland today after a heavy artillery barrage. The attack, which was spread from the Dutch town of Venlo on the German border south to Roermond, in a sector last reported held by American armor, ran into a wall of fire and steel, front line dispatches said. Von Model was striking desperately to relieve his forces caught in a series of tightening pincers in west Holland.

Reinforced Canadian forces fighting on both sides of the Schelde in westward advances to open Antwerp, were reinforced by British troops who landed on South Beveland island north of the estuary and established a seven-square-mile beachhead. Berlin accounts said this bridgehead was "several kilometers deep" and was in the neighborhood of Hoedekenskerke, 53 miles ahead of Canadian spearheads driving into the island from the east.

Attempt fails A second attempt to land several thousand troops in American amphibian tanks and landing craft at Hansweert, to the east of this bridgehead and across the South Beveland canal just ahead of the Canadian spearhead was broken up this morning, the Germans declared. Field dispatches said several towns were captured in the beachhead by the British who crossed the three to five-mile wide Schelde at 4 a. m. yesterday, swarmed up the 20-foot (Continued on Page Two)

Allies Hit Heavy Nazi Defenses

ROME, Oct. 27 (AP)—Eighth army forces advancing up the Po valley along highway 9 toward Bologna have come up against heavy German defenses two miles east of Forli, allied headquarters announced today. British and Canadian troops reached the Ronco river on a broad front and at several points patrols crossed the swollen stream but were withdrawn following sharp German counterattacks with tanks.

Finns Cut Major Nazi Escape Gap

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 27 (AP)—Finnish troops have spearheaded behind the Germans and captured Kittila, 80 miles north of Rovaniemi on the Arctic circle, and cut one of the major Nazi escape routes, the Finnish communiqué announced today.

JAPS GAMBLE FLEET; LOSE 27 WARSHIPS

Nips Successful In Penetrating Leyte Gulf

U. S. PACIFIC FLEET HEADQUARTERS, Pearl Harbor, Oct. 27 (AP)—A Japanese naval disaster, threatening momentarily to surpass Nippon's 35-warship tragedy of 1942 off Guadalcanal, stemmed today from an amazing gamble which actually succeeded in getting enemy warships perilously close to America's invasion beaches on Leyte.

The confirmed sinking or damaging of 27 warships, including three carriers and 10 battleships in a trio of naval-air encounters off the Philippines, tells a far from completed story. Remnants of the once proud imperial fleet which, it now can be disclosed, actually penetrated Leyte gulf and attacked transporters engaged in Gen Douglas MacArthur's landings, still were under relentless air pursuit. These are generally conceded to be the underlying sources of the strength of the Fourth Amendment, politically-frozen incumbent vote (federal holders and their voting interests).

There is a disturbing thought: These will be the underlying sources of the strength of the fifth term, a sixth possible fifth term, a sixth term in the case of the South, a fair chance will GROW in the time passes).

These issues (solid South, incumbency, personal interest) DOMESTIC issues. It is possible that the minds of most voters who are influenced by these are MADE UP, and will not be changed. It is quite possible that the minds of ALLERS who will be influenced by domestic issues are so fully up that there will be little change from here on out.

There remains in America a considerable body of independent voters who can still be influenced one way or the other, and the conclusion that foreign will be the influencing factor.

This Tuesday night speech, they made this striking in regard to foreign policy: President Roosevelt, powerful as he is, can not send American troops to fight on foreign soil to bring the peace of the world. It will have to be done by the Congress.

Suspicious, unfriendly conversation is highly unlikely to be a PERSONAL commitment made by President Roosevelt who has flouted congress so often as to have aroused deep resentment and suspicion.

There is general expectation even if President Roosevelt were to be elected for a fourth term, the congress will be unfriendly to him.

They don't have to guess at what will happen in the event. They have a HISTORICAL example. President Wilson made national commitments without the advice or consent of congress that he had treated very poorly.

There is no result is history. They on Monday night made a pledge: I am elected, I will WORK FOR CONGRESS. He read the names of men who are certain to be leaders in the next congress that they will WORK FOR HIM if he is elected.

There is better—hang our hopes of world peace on ONE MAN who has demonstrated that he can not only not work understanding and effectively with congress, but which MUST under the constitution ratify whatever is in the way of American nation in international relations to prevent war, or to bring a NEW MAN who can and will work with congress in shaping American foreign policy in critical days that lie ahead.

There is clear vision of hindsight in the answer. Congress and the President work together in mutual confidence, our chances of winning some effective world organization to bring the peace will be slim.

There is words and tones that carried the conviction of his sincerity to the man who heard him on the night. Dewey made his belief that parliamentarianism is a place in American foreign policy. He pledged himself in (Continued on Page Four)
