

TEMPORARY ARMY AIR BASE SLATED

An army air base will be installed within the city limits of Klamath Falls for several days next week when the army air force's "Shot From the Sky" exhibit of captured enemy aerial equipment is set up on the carnival grounds on South 8th, for display Tuesday and Wednesday. AAF officials with the exhibit announced today that the grounds will be designated an army base while the German and Jap equipment, now government property, is displayed here. Military police and a shore patrol from the marine, army and naval installations near Klamath Falls will guard the equipment and patrol the grounds.

It was announced today that exhibit visitors purchasing war bonds on the carnival grounds will be given rides in a navy "weasel"—amphibious jeep—or in an army scout car.

"Shot From the Sky" is a free exhibit and will be open both afternoons, and evening with a stage show being presented at 7:30 both evenings.

BARRETT'S BECOME 7-STAR PARENTS

PFC Irvin Barrett is in the Hawaiian Islands. He joined the army in 1940. PFC Clifton Barrett has been overseas with the U. S. army 2 1/2 years and is now in New Guinea. He has been in the service since 1941. The Barrett's third army son, PFC Lewis Barrett, in the army three years, is back in the U. S. at Ford Ord, Calif., after being stationed in New Guinea two years.

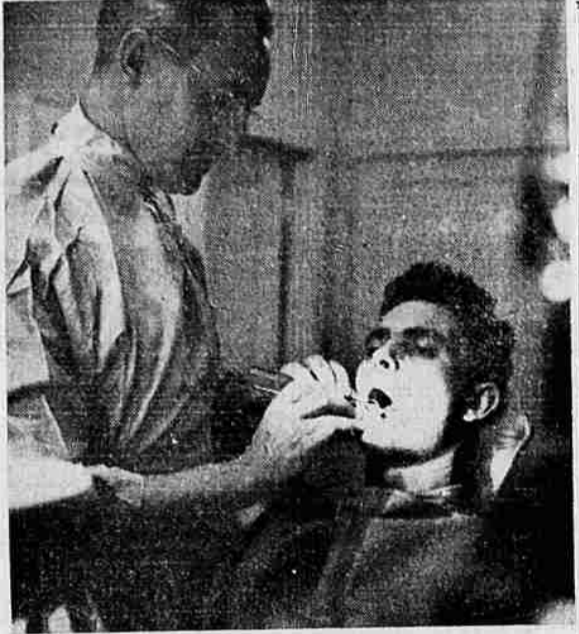
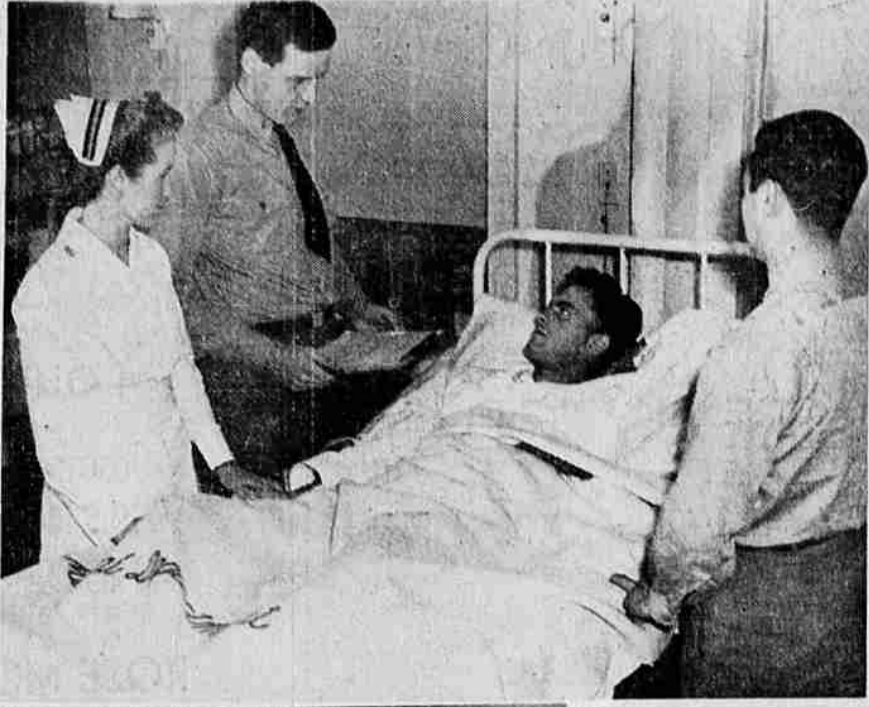

HOUSE RENT, SALE LIFT AUTHORIZED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—Higher sales and rental ceilings on new houses, ranging up to \$8000 purchase price and \$65 a month rental in high cost areas, were authorized today by the national housing administration and the war production board.

The action, coupled with the removal of all occupancy restrictions, applies to NHA's so-called "H-2" housing program which was announced in July but stalled from the start because builders were not interested in undertaking home construction at the lower price limits then prevailing.

Upward of 80,000 new units of "larger and better quality housing" are expected to result from the liberalized rules.

Lifting of occupancy restrictions means that persons other than war workers can buy or rent the new houses.

The new step completes a liberalization program begun last week with the lifting of some restrictions on materials and design—a move NHA said would permit the building of houses "approximating prewar standards."

TO CHRISTEN SHIP
CORVALLIS, Oct. 27 (AP)—A former 4-H girl from Union, Ore., WAC Cpl. Jean Ann Richards, will christen the Liberty ship Charles L. McNary at Houston, Tex., November 3.

The name of the ship was chosen by Oregon's 4-H club officers, given the privilege by the U. S. maritime commission.

The teachers, meeting at Portland-Columbia airport, were given practical demonstrations of the operation of commercial airlines.

Smiley Held For Grand Jury

PORTLAND, Oct. 27 (AP)—Samuel Carpenter Smiley, accused of shooting Frank J. Constantino, fellow-bartender, in a night club here, Monday, was held today for the grand jury after waiving preliminary hearing.

Smiley, 39, was charged with first degree murder, grand larceny and obtaining money under false pretenses—the latter two charges not connected with the shooting.

Increase In Trade With Far East Seen

PORTLAND, Oct. 27 (AP)—Sharply increased trade between the agricultural Far East and the industrial United States was predicted today by a government representative of the Netherlands Indies.

Lt. Cmdr. L. P. DeStoppelaar, on leave from the Royal Netherlands navy to confer with businessmen of this country on post-war trade prospects, said he expected the United States to supplant Europe as the Far East's main market and supplier.

WORKERS NEEDED FOR YARD JOBS

Klamath Falls men and women who are not now employed in essential war industry are wanted for ship repair work at the West Coast Navy Yards, according to Ernest Parmentier, manpower recruiting officer for the yards, who will conduct a labor recruiting campaign here, Friday and Saturday of this week.

Persons interested in a position in the navy yard may contact Parmentier at the U. S. employment office during business hours, Jack Almeter, head of the local office announced today.

Men from 18 up and women from 20 up, will be considered regardless of experience, Parmentier said, although experienced shipfitters, sheet metal workers, electricians, pipe-fitters, welders and machinists are chiefly needed.
