

Roosevelt Digs Gov. Dewey's Political Strategy

President Roosevelt, hitting Dewey's political strategy in a speech prepared for a platform appearance at Madison, Del., Mr. Roosevelt spoke in reproach of the "In every way possible to prove that a horse is a chestnut horse." The president, "that applies very to some of the republican oratory which has been agitating the air."

Brief Stopover
Roosevelt's Wilmington stop was a brief one en route to Philadelphia tonight for a radio broadcast (6 p. m. CBS-MBS) from Shiloh. While his subject was announced as "The New Deal and Business," Presidential Secretary Stephen Early told him that in the main it was to do with the basic of the war.

Most other things in this political campaign, the issue of new deal and business in which participants differ. For example:

Senator John W. Bricker of the republican vice president nominee, told an audience that "If the new deal is to extend the wartime it will find some authority in the language of statutes and, besides it has a new attorney general and support to help it."

Supports Fair Play
Ex-chairman Donald M. Dewey of the war production board, said in a broadcast from Madison, "the president endorses and supports the in its policy of fair play. We used our power only for war purposes. The president knows how for great ship."

Mr. Dewey will speak again to over 100,000 from Kansas at 7:30 p. m. PWT. on "The President Roosevelt and the relations and defense."

Mr. Dewey's businessmen disapproved "bankrupt" to a radio debate at New between Senator Ferguson and Interior Secretary.

New Deal Bankrupt
The new deal, said Ferguson, bankrupt in principle, bankrupt in politics, bankrupt in deed. He said that "every new deal got its hands on a new job," that job done.

Mr. Dewey rejoined that Republican Thomas E. Dewey own a "tinker toy" to foreign affairs and Dewey's falsifications and misstatements have demonstrated that he does not have the character or the highest office in the land.

Mr. Dewey and heckling, mixed applause, helped make it a debate.

Works On Farm Talk
Mr. Dewey worked at a farm speech he delivered over the radio from New York, tomorrow at 10 a. m. PWT. He has indicated that he will dwell on the need for "essentially good" of present farm production of ending what he called "bureaucratic domination."

With the election just 10 days off, other more or less words fed into the political arena included:

Mr. Butler (R-Neb.), at Madison, said the president one more than almost any president to bring the policies into disorder and disruption of our country.

Mr. Truman, democratic presidential nominee, declared from a farm speech at Madison, to declare, "The new deal is desperate to win this election. The Hearst papers have even gone so far as to call me a member of the Ku Klux Klan. That charge is a falsehood. I never have been a member of the Klan or attended any of its meetings in my life."

Ball Criticisms
Senator Ball (R-Minn.) broadened his foreign policy criticisms of Governor Dewey to declare in a Washington broadcast that Dewey has "failed to offer the American people a workable, constructive program of taxation and labor relations."

The White House, in a statement, said that Dewey's criticism of a 7 per cent cut in the budget bureau in war department funds in 1939 overlooked the fact that these funds were increased 800 per cent above the previous years.

William L. Hutcheson, president of the AFL-CIO union, said in New York, speaking for himself, that the Roosevelt administration has compiled a "dismal record of labor runarounds."

Sidney Hillman, chairman of the CIO political action committee, said in a Rochester, N. Y., rally that "In each speech he (Dewey) minimizes our wartime task; tries to belittle the vital role of commander-in-chief and campaigns as though the war had already been won."
