Pelicans May Be Without Services Of Bob Perkins In Tilt With Loggers

Bob Perkins, field general for the 1944 edition of the Klamath Pelicans, is a doubtful starter in the last night game to be played by Klamath Union high school on Modoc field this season. The Eureka Loggers will provide the competition for the local lads tonight in what should be a spectacular game.

Perk is nursing a badly bruised leg received in the Medford battle and has been on the sidelines all week. Bob Redkey, another casualty from the big game last Friday night, was back in uniform Thursday, although he was still limping slightly. With the return of the freshman flash, the Pelicans are at full strength for the fray tonight, with the exception of Perkins.

In a brief practice session Thursday afternoon, Coach Marble Cook had both the first and second string eleven's working on aerial defense as the Loggers will probably fill the air with passes in an attempt to outscore the Pelicans.

Coach Marble Cook will start Kimscoy and Thurman at the flanker positions with Mason and Long taking care of the tackle slots. Wirth will team with Wilson to plug the guard holes and Vanderhoff will hold down the pivot position.

Berry is being groomed for quarterback and either Redkey or Abbey will start at right half. Henthorne, Jack Kizer turned riddler, may fill in for Perk at left half and Biehn is a sure starter at the fullback slot.

Cook is confident of a victory for the Pelicans, and everything is set for a thrilling ball game. The kick-off is slated for 8 p. m.

Irish May Use Freshman

McKeever Awaiting Results Of Exams; Then Watch Out

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 27 (AP)—Time plodded on for Coach Ed McKeever of Notre Dame today.

The young gride mentor of the country's No. 1 team was ready—and more than willing—to spring an unheralded defensive fullback on Illinois tomorrow when he meets what probably will be the toughest of his assignments thus far in an unbeaten season.

But he was marking time until Navy V-12 instructors get around to posting marks in recent examinations.

The halfback is Marty Wendell, a freshman from Chicago—"the only defensive man I ever saw I was afraid to let scrimmage against the varsity," McKeever said today in an interview.

Illinois' threat is bringing an all-out offense, and McKeever wants Wendell in there to stop that "buzz-bomb" Young, who has scored 10 touchdowns and averaged the amazing figure of 12.7 yards from scrimmage in 43 tries—a total of 546 yards.

McKeever's worries about Wendell apparently are not unfounded. Early in the season he hit two varsity halfbacks so hard, on consecutive plays in practice, that both were retired for several days. Last year he stopped Young cold in the championship game, the only prep backer-up ever to do it, and because of it, Wendell and his St. George high won the city title.

Roesch Plays Final Game For Bruins

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 27 (AP)—It will be Jackrabbit Johnny Roesch's last appearance in a UCLA football uniform for the duration as he lines up in the Coliseum tonight against the strong Alameda Coast Guard eleven.

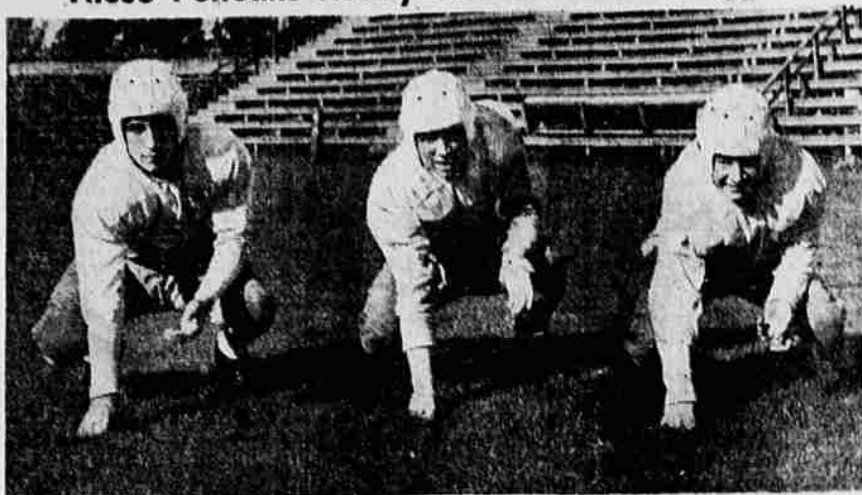

He scored two touchdowns in the last two minutes to give UCLA a 13-13 tie with Southern California. He rang up two more in the waning minutes against San Diego naval training station, to which the Bruins lost, 12-14. He galloped for three touchdowns against St. Mary's, and he counted two more in the last few minutes against St. Mary's Pre-Flight.

The 'Cats scored first in the second stanza, when Tommy Edwards galloped 45 yards to the Grants Pass three-yard line before he was brought down. From there, Coleman flipped a short pass to Glidden for the touch-down and Coleman added the extra point with a well-placed drop-kick to put the 'Cats out in front, 7-0, at the end of the first half.

The Cavemen came back fighting and pushed over a tally in the third period on a 85-yard sustained drive. The extra point was good to knot the count at 7-7.

In the final frame, the Wildcats showed they had the old stuff by putting on a 85-yard drive with Mocabee finally going over from the two-yard stripe to give the local lads six more points and their margin of victory. The game ended with the Wildcats on their way to another touchdown with the ball in their possession on the Cavemen eight-yard line.

Coach Paul Angstead stated that his charges looked good on plays outside tackle and around end, but were able to do nothing through the center of the big Grants Pass line. Their passing attack clicked well and the game gave them valuable experience.

Angstead further stated that the local eleven was on the defensive throughout the entire first half, but the boys had the punch when it was needed and came out on the long end of another ball game.

Finest Shooting Season In Two Decades on Wa

140,000,000 Wild Waterfowl Expected In States Next Week From Canada

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (AP)—The "duckiest" shooting season in two decades is winging its way toward U. S. nimrods.

Some 140,000,000 waterfowl, biggest crop in 20 years, are expected in the states next week from Canada's duck factory, heating the big north-of-the-border freeze by a few days.

Ducks Unlimited, the sportsman's support organization which aids and abets the breeding of ducks in 1,200,000 acres of dominion territory, announced today through Executive Secretary Ray Benson that the early flight of Teal, Pintails and Mallards was already on its way and that some shooting has been heard in border states where the season opened a month ago.

But the heavy firing—and the good eating—are still to come in the form of northern Mallards, Blue Bills and Canvas Backs, along with the huge geese known to the trade as "Honkers."

Last year, Benson disclosed, the water fowl flight consisted of 125,000,000. About 16,000,000 fell before the booming shotguns of a million and a quarter marksmen. That means that for every one killed, seven others (including the ones at which you and I fired) winged on to winter in the southland.

This year's estimate of 140,000,000 ducks is 100,000,000 above that of the 1935-36 when hunting seasons will bag away for 30 days. This year the Ducks Unlimited eradicated population through its ground restoration and management program, has saved ducks at a cost of about cents each, Benson said.
