\$15,000 DAMAGE SUIT FILED HERE

T. S. Lawrence has filed a \$15,000 damage suit in circuit court against H. W. Gladitsch, the suit arising out of a work accident.

The complaint states that the plaintiff suffered severe injuries to his right leg between the knee and ankle on August 14, 1944, while he was working for the defendant, Gladitsch, according to the complaint, is engaged in the moving of heavy articles of equipment with power-driven machinery and Lawrence was doing this type of work at the time of the accident.

Attorneys for the plaintiff are U. S. Balentine and H. E. Perkins.

Completion of Spud Expected Soon

The spud harvest will be practically completed this weekend, it was announced by the county agent's office Friday. There is considerable work still to be done on the onion crop in the south end of the Klamath basin.

Weather has been favorable to fall work and many growers are leveling land, improving irrigation systems, burning weeds and potatoes vines and other miscellaneous fall work. Most growers feel that a rain would be advantageous as the weather is extremely dry and moisture would be beneficial to the fall seed crops.

FORESTER LAUDS 'GREEN' COMMITTEE

One of the outstanding contributions to the "Stop Forest Fires" and "Keep Oregon Green" campaigns, was made by the Klamath Falls committee, of which Walt Wiesendanger is chairman.

This sentiment was expressed in a letter received by Wiesendanger from H. J. Andrews, regional forester, who called work of the committee a "real public service accomplishment."

Edmund Hayes, chairman of the executive committee of "Keep Oregon Green," advised Wiesendanger that incomplete fire reports show a definite decrease in the number of man-made fires on state and private forest lands, indicative of one of the best fire seasons on record. "You and your cooperators have been the forces that have carried our message directly to the people," stated Hayes.

Canadian 1st Army—Seized German's west anchor of Bergen Op Zoom without a fight and bit within a mile of the stronghold of Roosendaal, as the entire German stand in west Holland began collapsing under Canadian and British blows.

British 1st Army—Closed within five miles of Breda after winning Tilburg and 'S Heretogenbosch.

U. S. 1st Army—Met light artillery fire in the Aachen sector and along the Belgian-German frontier east of St. Vith.

U. S. 3rd Army—Made limited progress farther south between Bruyeres and Le Tholy.

U. S. 7th Army—Broke up attempts to infiltrate our positions in the Vosges mountains, and inflicted losses on the enemy.

Judge James A. Fee had set today as the time for sentencing. Both are in the Jackson county jail.
