made in a note handed by the Argentine charge d'affaires in Washington, Rodolfo Garcia-Arca, to the Pan-American union.

Explanations Possible  
The statement declared the conference would afford all countries "an opportunity to explain their points of view" and added:

"Thus they will have available all the elements responsible for judgment on which to act with full knowledge of the case. Only a correct statement of the problem can take into account the external actions which mark the international conduct of a country and not the presumed intentions attributable to one group or another."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—The state department today said it had received no communication from the Argentine government suggesting a conference of foreign ministers of the American republicans.

It was announced that if such a communication is received, the United States will act upon it only after exchanging views with the other western hemisphere governments.

### CONTROVERSY OVER POLICE DELAYED

The council controversy over the police department, which burst into the open last Monday night, will probably not be revived officially until a week from next Monday. Unless Mayor John Houston calls a special meeting Monday night, the regular council meeting will not be held because it is a "fifth Monday" of the month.

Mayor Houston remarked today that he feels Chief of Police Earl Heuvel has done a good job, and added that it is his intention to keep Heuvel as chief until his term expires at the first of the year. "Of course, mistakes have been made," said Houston. "Everybody makes them. But under the difficult circumstances which have prevailed, I think Chief Heuvel and the department have served the city well."

Tour of Duty  
His marine corps service includes a tour of duty in Haiti, in Cuba, sea duty on the USS Oklahoma, and as commander of rifle ranges at Cape May, N. J., Wakefield, Mass., and Quantico, Va.

Since Pearl Harbor, the lieutenant colonel has served on Samoa, Guadalcanal and New Zealand with the third marines before the Bougainville campaign. Col. Van Orden's outfit took part in 75 per cent of the actual line fighting on Bougainville, and the stocky, 38-year-old officer's ability and courage won for him the Navy Cross.

Though slightly wounded by machine gun fire on D-Day, November 1, 1943, he stayed in the front lines at Cape Torokina.

He was also outstanding for his leadership and example in the recent Guam campaign, and was returned to the states shortly after Guam became an American possession again.

### Bulgaria Signs Armistice Terms

MOSCOW, Oct. 28 (AP)—An official announcement tonight said that Bulgaria had signed an armistice with the allies.

(A Moscow broadcast, reported by the federal communications commission, said the armistice agreement came at the conclusion of two days of negotiations in the Russian capital between representatives of Russia, Britain and the United States and the Bulgarian delegation.

the east, the Breda-Tilburg road was cut, and Breda itself was a target for converging columns of Polish and Canadian troops.

4. Tilburg was in the hands of British troops, who got a tumultuous welcome from the Dutch population, although a few snipers still clung to the western fringes of the city.

5. North of Tilburg, an armor and infantry slash carried through Loon Op Zand and headed for Oosterhout on the escape route from Breda to the Geertruidenberg bridge over the Maas. Here the British were only six miles from the Maas.

### JAPS OPEN DRIVE ON KWANGSI POSTS

preparations for the major operation.

The drive began with twin thrusts down both sides of the Hunan-Kwangsi railway, which lashed at Chinese defenses from 14 to 17 miles east of Kweilin. Still another column swung southwestward from Kwangyang, 50 miles east northeast of Kweilin, with the ultimate aim of joining the general attack and bringing under two-sided pressure the city which the Chinese have said would prove "China's Stalingrad."

Move To Outflank  
As the Japanese blasted their way down the railway, a supporting column moved to outflank Kweilin from the west. The Chinese said fighting raged at all points of the attack.

In a move to protect the left flank of this offensive, a Japanese force based in the Hunan province town of Yungming, 75 miles east of Kweilin, jabbed southward across the Kwangsi border against Fuchuan, 35 miles distant.

On the west river front, the Chinese said, another new Japanese drive, one of two aimed at the American air base city of Liuchow, 95 miles southwest of Kweilin, had sprung westward 18 miles beyond its base at Pingnam. The other push toward Liuchow is being attempted from the Kweping area, southeast of Liuchow.

### New Assignment Set for Stilwell

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—General Stilwell has been recalled from his triple command in the Far East and will be given a new and important, but at present, undisclosed assignment.

Stilwell's recall was announced by the White House. A few minutes later, the war department added that he was headed for an important new post.
