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Homemaking Highlights

From the Office of the Home Demonstration Agent
Food news of the week, is, of course, pumpkins. There are plenty, say dealers, as well as a good supply of cider and apples. Judging from the number of inquiries this office has had about games and decorations for children's Halloween parties, there will be a lot of "ghosting" going on around and about Klamath on the big night.
The "American Scene" is changing rapidly these days, and the next traditional item to fall beneath the axe is reported to be the familiar picture of the bottle of milk on the doorstep. Light destroys valuable riboflavin in the milk, scientists say, therefore, milk should be placed in an insulated, closed box, rather than left in broad daylight—especially if it might remain there for any length of time.
Mrs. Gillen was somewhat nonplused, at the conclusion of last Monday's Homemaker's broadcast, when she discussed the effect of light on milk, to be called to the phone by a worried housewife who wanted to know whether the refrigerator light would destroy the riboflavin in the milk stored there. But just in time, the HDA remembered the "little man who isn't there" . . . who takes care of the problem nicely, thanks.

Oh, . . . one more note on Halloween. If you are entertaining grown-ups for dinner that night, why not serve cranberry cocktail? It is a piquant and refreshing appetizer, and is made by covering every pound of berries with 3 or 4 cups of water, and cooking until they are tender. Sieve or strain them through cheesecloth, sweeten the product to taste, add a bit of salt and dilute with water or ginger ale until the flavor suits you. Chill until time to place before your guests.

PORTLAND, Oct. 28 (AP)—Old-age assistance was given to 19,620 persons in Oregon in September, the state public welfare commission reported yesterday at its monthly meeting here. More than 43 per cent of them received the maximum amount of \$40 or more. General public assistance was given 25,523 persons at a cost of \$936,821.75.

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
