LAKEVIEW—An old timer, Benjamin Franklin Cloud, died Thursday morning at Lakeview after several years of ailing health. He was born 92 years ago in Springfield, Mo., and came west with his parents, who were one of the earliest settlers in the south end of Goose Lake valley. Most of his active years were spent ranching south of New Pine Creek.

His wife died in 1925 and he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Ernest Robnett of New Pine Creek, and Mrs. Leo Mulkey of Willow Ranch; one son, G. F. of Lovelock, Nevada; three brothers, James B., Cedarville; Tom, Willow Ranch; and John of Cheney, Wash., and one sister, Mrs. Martha Miller of Willow Ranch.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 1 o'clock at Ousley chapel with Rev. J. M. Cooper conducting. Burial will be in Chico, Calif., where his wife rests.
