The Purpose of Baptism

The religious world has a number of ways today for men to be saved from their sins. Some say "Just believe on the Lord, and take Him as your personal Savior." Still others say, "Just kneel down by your radio and pray, God will forgive you and make you a child of His." Some say, "Just stand where you are and raise your hand if you want God to save you." All this teaching is completely foreign to the New Testament.

Since the Scriptures are our guide in religious matters let us look to them to answer the purpose of baptism.

Baptism is for the remission of sins. "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." (Acts 2:38).

"And now why tarriest thou? Arise and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on his name." (Acts 22:16).

"He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, but he that believeth not shall be damned." (Mk. 16:15, 16). Many of the religious world today have it this way: "He that believeth and is saved may be baptized."

Baptism is not only for the remission of sins, but it is the act of obedience that puts us into Christ. "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ did put on Christ." (Gal. 3:27).

We also have the promise of the gift of the Holy Spirit when we are baptized into Christ. "Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." (Acts 2:38).

It is not the physical act of baptism that saves, but God forgives us of our past sins when we manifest our faith in Him by submitting to baptism.

Let me urge all who have not done so to obey the Lord and be baptized that you may be a Christian and a joint heir with Christ.

"For behold your calling, brethren, that not many wise after the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble, are called; but God chose the foolish things of the world, that He might put to shame them that are wise; and God chose the weak things of the world, that He might put to shame the things that are strong." (I Cor. 1:27, 28).

FIRST MORTGAGE BONDS OFFERED

Halsey, Stuart and company, Inc., heads a group of investment bankers which is publicly offering \$13,500,000 of the California Oregon Power company first mortgage bonds, series due November 1, 1974, 3 1/2 per cent, at 102.88 per cent and interest. Net proceeds from the sale of the bonds, together with general funds of the company, will be applied to the redemption of all of the first mortgage bonds 4 per cent series due 1966, now outstanding. Upon completion of this financing, the company's capitalization will consist of the \$13,500,000 first mortgage bonds, \$2,800,000 serial notes, preferred stocks of \$7,792,700 par value and common stock of \$7,800,000, stated value.

The California Oregon Power company is an operating public utility company serving electricity, water, and in some communities, gas, to an estimated population of 148,000 in southern Oregon and northern California, the principal cities being Klamath Falls and Medford. It also sells a substantial amount of electricity at wholesale. Most of the company's generating capacity of about 100,000 kilowatts is hydro-electric, although it also operates under lease a steam plant of about 15,000 kilowatts capacity.
