Tomorrow. November 10, the marine corps will celebrate its 169th year as a military force. A befitting tribute on this day is the message read by commanding officers to all marines wherever they might be—guarding vital island installations, on the battle fronts, or here in the United States:

ON November 10, 1775, a corps of marines was created by a resolution of continental congress. Since that date many thousands of men have borne the name marines. In memory of them it is fitting that we who are marines should commemorate the birthday of our corps by calling to mind the glaries of its long and illustrious history.

DURING 92 of the 169 years of its existence, the corps has been in action against the nation's foes. From the battle of Trenton to the Argonne, marines have won foremost honors in war and in the long eras of tranquility at home. Generation after generation of marines have grown gray in war in every corner of the seven seas that our country and its citizens might enjoy peace and security.

N every battle and skirmish since the birth of our corps, marines have acquitted themselves with the greatest distinction, winning new honors on each occasion until the term "marine" has come to signify all that is highest in military efficiency and soldierly virtue.

THIS high name of distinction and soldierly repute, we who are marines today, have received from those who preceded us in the corps.
