Police Identify Child, Find Another Unknown Girl

SEATTLE, Nov. 10 (AP)—Police today had identified a 34-year-old baby boy found Monday in a Seattle hotel room but are seeking identity of a red-headed girl, about 5, found yesterday on a downtown street corner.

The boy was identified as William Lyle Beckwith after police took his father, William A. Beckwith, 29-year-old truck driver, into custody last night when he returned to the hotel to claim baggage.

Capt. A. E. Duggins said the father was held for questioning when he failed to give a satisfactory explanation as to why he had not called at the hotel or identified himself sooner, although admitting he had known the child had been picked up.

The second child, police said, was reported by shop owners to have been left on the corner by a woman who failed to return.

Gov. Dewey to Rest From Campaigning

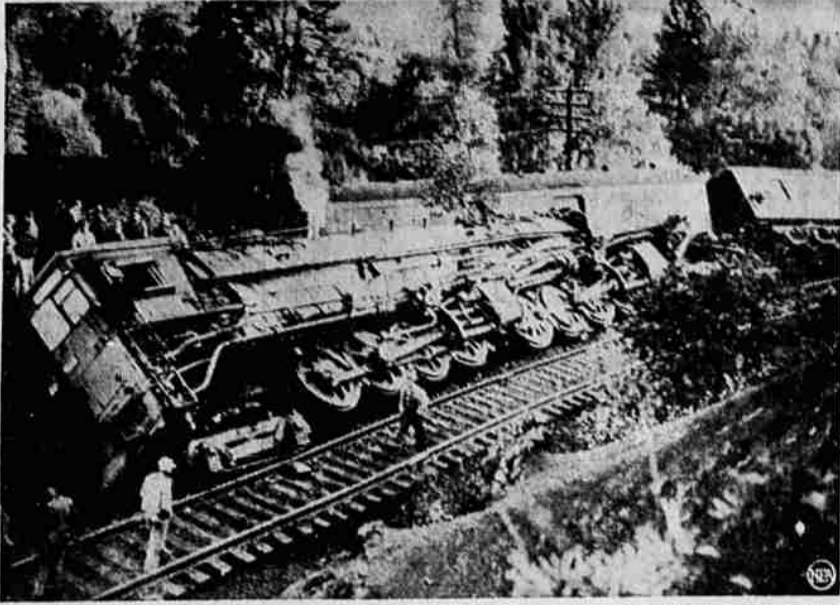
ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 10 (AP)—Governor Dewey said today he would leave tomorrow morning for Sea Island, Ga., where he will spend about two weeks resting from his presidential campaign.

Mrs. Dewey and their two sons, Thomas Jr., 12, and John Martin, 8, will accompany the defeated republican presidential nominee.

An aide said that as far as politics was concerned, the governor would be "deaf, dumb and blind."

He said the governor was pleased with the large popular vote in the presidential race. President Roosevelt's margin—so far slightly more than 3,000,000 votes—was the smallest in any presidential election since 1916.

In the first flush of victory, after the American landings of 10 days ago, cheering, grinning, saluting, flag-waving Filipinos lined the streets to greet the doughboys. Little boys saluted with gusto every passing man

in uniform, be he general or war correspondent. Children held up their fingers in a "V" greeting in every block.

Residents of this city of 30,000 exclaimed on every hand: "Very glad you Americans come; very glad. We waited long time." Pretty, neatly dressed girls gave the G.I.'s a big morale boost by seeking their autographs.

U. S. 7th Army—Captures village in Meurthe valley and reaches edge of Foret Domania de Champ in France.

22 COMMUNICABLE DISEASES LISTED

The Oregon Health bulletin revealed that Klamath county had a total of 22 communicable diseases reported for the week ending November 4 of this year. Of these, four were measles, four were pneumonia, one was chicken pox, one was mumps, two were syphilis and ten were gonorrhea.

Adjoining Lake county reported a perfect week with no communicable diseases reported, with 100 per cent of physicians reporting.

Klamath county also reported a total of 23 deaths for the month of September this year. Causes of death were, one of syphilis, one of another communicable disease, one of cancer and tumors, one of diabetes, two of apoplexy, five of heart disease, two of pneumonia, one of nephritis, two from motor accidents, two from other accidents and four from other known causes.

Lake county had one death from heart disease for the same month.

Council Meeting Postponed For Day

The regular meeting of the city council, scheduled for Monday night, will be held Tuesday as Mayor John H. Houston and Councilman Walter Wiesendanger will be absent. Four councilmen will meet and adjourn until Tuesday night.

He declared that "not enough ammunition to keep one American division in combat for a single week" has reached Chinese armies via lend lease from the United States in the last 27 months.
