Initial Concert To Be Heard Wednesday

Klamath folks are looking forward to the appearance here at the Pelican on Wednesday night at 8 o'clock sharp, of the General Platoff Don Cossack chorus, first of a series of concerts arranged under the banner of the Klamath Community Concert association.

Due to the fact that a full house has been sold, members this year will not be permitted to bring their guests including service men. The committee regrets this, but lack of space prohibits including others than members.

Tickets will not be sold at the door, there are no reserved seats, and the theatre will open at 7 o'clock. All tickets which have been turned into Mrs. Claude H. It takes a chorus such as the famous General Platoff Don Cossacks to give full flavor to the various war songs that have recently come out of Russia. Last season it was Lev Knipper's "Meadowland," Bogoslovsky's "Beloved City," and "Borodino," a Russian cavalry song, all new soviet soldier songs that only the true soldier knows how to sing.

Thus, these doughty, one-time cavalry officers, seasoned fighters of the Steppes, inject an excitement into their singing that is difficult to describe. With their massed virile tone, they strike fire in the hearts of their hearers. Only the decorum of the concert hall keeps the audience from joining in. But rousing cheers are the aftermath.

Clad in their shiny regimentals of black and red, their blouses of red, blue, or white, interchangeable for the different sections of the program, their black riding boots glistening with polish, their caps at a saucy angle, they make a bright spot of color on the concert stage.

Small wonder that the chorus receives such a rousing welcome from our men in the armed forces. Again this past season they made a record tour of USO camp shows, and in addition sang in 125 cities for the Fifth War Loan drive.
