"Ralph is one day old." As the young preacher began his sermon that Sunday morning—October 29th, it was—he told the people of the birth of Ralph, their first-born, the day before. He said that while the little fellow was but a day old, he knew that the boy would break out into sin and that he must be born again. I have a nature that turns to sin and so has his mother and so it will be with the Babe. Then the man's voice took on deep concern—Would that I might know that my son would be born again. Ye must be born again, was his text. He told of one of their members who had been born twice and had a double birthday. Her second birthday was of God from above and on the same day and month as her human birth. We said that being born twice, she is to die but once. She will not see the Second Death—Whosoever was not found written in the Lamb's Book of Life was cast into the Lake of Fire. This is the Second Death—BIBLE. BIRTH CERTIFICATE—You can get a birth certificate and prove your birth into this world and your friends can say whether you have been born of God, from above. To the Twice-Born old things have passed away. All has become new. After the sermon came an altar call with three high school students and a boy from the grades coming to the front. It was a United Presbyterian church and the preacher asked—Did they believe the Bible to be the word of God? And did they accept the shed blood of Christ as washing away their sins? BORN AGAIN—How explain the mystery of the New Birth? How become children of God and his heirs? It is when God breathes his life into your soul. Then old things pass away and all things become new. Salvation Before or After Baptism?

In every case of conversion in the New Testament after the church was instituted men and women were commanded to be baptized. This baptism preceded salvation in every case. However, in this modern age, it is quite common to hear teachers and ministers say "Baptism is not essential to one's salvation." All you need do to be forgiven of your past sins, they say, is to, "Trust the Lord as your personal Savior."

Jesus said in Mk. 16:16, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Notice the order in which Jesus puts it—"believe," "baptized," "saved." Peter said, "Which after a true likeness doth now save you, even baptism, not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the interrogation of a good conscience toward God, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ." (1 Pet. 3:21). We do not walk with the Lord in newness of life until we are baptized. Rom. 6:4 says, "We were buried therefore with him through baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life." We become new creatures in Christ when we are baptized into Christ. Gal. 3:7 says, "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ." Then II Cor. 5:17 says, "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature."
