Germans have not heard a broadcast by Hitler since July 21, when a voice purporting to be his spoke over the radio to announce that a plot against his life the preceding day had been thwarted.

Yesterday's manifesto, sounding every appeal to steel the German will, marked the post-poned celebration of the Nov. 8, 1923, Munich beer hall putsch and a mass swearing in of men in the volkssturm, or German home guard. The Berlin radio called it a 'day of national rising."

Employing the use of the first person, the Hitler manifesto re-iterated the nazi bugbears on the menace of "international Jewry" and "bolshevist barbar-isms" and dealared.

Jewry and "bolshevist barbar-isms," and declared:

"If in these times I speak seldom or little to the German people, this is due to my being at work in order to fulfill the tasks entrusted to me, and which must be fulfilled in order to turn our fortunes."

back to an anchorage.

No more Reinforcements
No more enemy reinforcements were reported landed at Ormoc, where the Japanese lost six destroyers, four transports, 13 planes and most of 800 troops Saturday as American carrier planes wiped out a convoy. It was expected that Yamashita had upwards of 45,000 troops in the Ormoc area, however.

American positions through the tortuous Carigara Bay-Ormoc sector were so scattered the headquarters map looked like a Christmas tree when pinpointed with colored pins.

Resistance Grows

Southeast of the 24th division sector, first cavairy troops were meeting increasing resistance on the Mt. Pina saddle. Tanks and mortar fire helped eradicate enemy pockets on both sides of the ridge.

Bombing of smoking Ormoc by heavy bombers caused "extensive destruction," MacArthur reported. The port on Leyte's west coast has been hit repeatedly by American bombers and fighters to prevent effective reinforcement of the squeezed Yamashita forces.

A spectacular daytime attack by Japanese fighters and divebombers on American shipping in crowded San Pedro Bay on Leyte was reported by Associated Press Correspondent Spencer Davis.

At the same time another Japanese force was reported to have seized Laipin, 45 miles south of Liuchow, and driven on 20 miles to the north. Still a third enemy column reached the outskirts Chienkiang, 55 miles southwest of Liuchow on the highway leading to the old provincial capital of Yungning (Nanning).

Kweilin—capital of Kwangsi province and aiso a former U.S. air base site 95 miles north of Liuchow—appeared lost. The Chinese high command acknowiedged that it had not been in contact with the garrison by radio since Friday—the day the Japanese reported capture of the city.
