German Journalist Minimizes Menace Of Postwar Reich

SEATTLE, Nov. 13 (P)—Mini, mizing the potential menace of a defeated Germany, Konrad Hei-den, German journalist who es-caped from the nazis into France in 1933, declared yesterday that England, along with Germany and France, will drop to the rark of a second rate power in a post-war world dominated by the United States, Russia and China. Heiden, one of 28 intellectuals given special visas to enter the U. S. from France in 1940, said "for at least 20 years she (Ger-many) will be psychologically afraid to effect the alliances that become dangerous." "And within 25 years Care

"And within 25 years Ger-many, like France and England, will appear among the nations that do not count any more as first rate powers."
