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

Which Baptism Is Valid Today?

The New Testament mentions five baptisms: the bapthe New restament mentions live baptisms: the baptism of John, the baptism of the Holy Spirit, the baptism of fire, the baptism of suffering, and the baptism of the commission. How can we know which baptism we are to receive today? Paul said in Eph. 4:4 "There is one Lord, one faith and one baptism." Since there is only one baptism, we want to be certain which it is want to be certain which it is.

John's baptism was for Israel and not for the Gentiles. (Acts 13:24). This baptism of John was only preparatory to Christ's baptism. (Acts 19:4).

The baptism of the Holy Spirit was never a command. It was a promise, and the only ones who received this baptism were the apostles at Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost, and the household of Cornelius at Cesarea Philippi ippi. (Acts 1 and 2; Acts 10).

The baptism of fire is the punishment which shall be meted out to all unrighteous after the great judgment. (Matt. 3:12).

The baptism of suffering is that to which Jesus referred, meaning his sufferings on the cross. (Mk. 10:38).

The baptism of the commission, however, was taught and commanded by our Lord and practised by all the apostles. Matt. 28:13 says, "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptising them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." This is the baptism, and the only baptism, we are authorized by the Holy Scriptures to administer.


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
