LT. SHULL KILLED

Lt. Keith R. Shull, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Gruberman of Chiloquitt, was killed in an aircraft accident, October 2, in Georgia, according to word received by relatives. Shull was flying a P-40 at the time he met his death. He was a graduate of Butte Falls, Ore., high school, spring of 1941, and that summer entered the air corps. He served at Kiska and Attu. Shull had ferried planes across the Atlantic. While over Italy on a mission, he received light wounds but continued on his missions. Lt. Shull had been chosen an instructor and would have been stationed permanently in the United States.

GRAY GRADUATED

Burton E. Gray, son of Irving E. Gray of Klamath Falls, has been graduated from Deming army air field, army air field, "The AAF's Border Bombardier School," it was announced here recently by Col. Milton M. Murphy, commanding officer. He has been commissioned a second lieutenant, and awarded silver bombardier wings after successfully undergoing the rigid 18-week course in high-altitude precision bombing as well as important phases of navigation. Prior to his assignment at DAAF he had completed training in aerial gunnery. Before entering the army air forces, Lt. Gray attended Klamath Union high school.

IN CALIFORNIA

MERRILL—Pvt. Charles Cunningham, formerly of Merrill, who is serving with the army service force, is now stationed at Pittsburg, Calif. He returned to the U. S. last spring after 10 months' service in Africa, visiting relatives here at that time. His wife, Mrs. Vivian Cunningham, is remaining here for the duration.

HUNNICUTT SAFE

MERRILL—James Hunnicutt, 34, naval gunner, son of Mrs. Mabel Hunnicutt, Merrill, is safe, according to a letter re-

ceived this week from him. Young Hunnicutt, who has been in the service for three years, was on board the carrier, Princeton, lost in the battle for Leyte and for two weeks following the sinking, his family was not informed of his safety. He made no mention of any injury in his letter which asked his mother "not to worry."

Mrs. Hunnicutt, mother of seven sons and a daughter, has three other sons, in addition to Jim, in the navy. Glenn has been in China for two years, Clyde is a gunner on a carrier and Bob is serving with a convoy ship. Frank Hunnicutt, an older son, has returned here from Los Angeles to make his home. Verne is employed by the government on military projects and is now in Portland, and Kenneth is in high school. The daughter is Mrs. Robert Donosky, Tulelake.

Three men from Klamath county are fighting with the 6th armored infantry battalion, veteran combat unit of the 1st armored division, which has been influential in pushing the Germans back on the fifth army front in northern Italy. They are 1st Lt. Richard L. Becken, 820 Oak street, who is a platoon leader, PFC. Calvin E. Bell, 2602 Bly street, mortar ammunition carrier, and Pvt. John A. Van Meter of Malin, who is a heavy mortar crewman.

KLAMATH'S FIRST WHITE BRIDE DIES

Klamath's first white bride, Mrs. Simpson Wilson, 90, died Sunday in Central Point at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Mary Foster.

Old-timers here, and especially in the Langell valley country, learned with regret of Mrs. Wilson's passing. As Nancy Ellen Hall, she became the bride of Simpson Wilson in the first white marriage solemnized in what is now Klamath county. Excerpts from the History of Klamath County as given by Mrs. Wilson's daughter, read: "My parents were married in Linkville, Jackson county, Ore., July 16, 1871. Mr. Meechin, justice of the peace, performed the ceremony. Mother's wedding dress was of blue worsted material. Those present were father's sister, Mary Elizabeth McDonald; mother's sister, Rachel Aylsworth; John Skeene, John Goddard and John Stevens. No honeymoon; they drove all day by wagon and team from Linkville to their home in Langell valley, eating lunch at the lower gap on Lost river. "To this union eight children

were born, two in Jackson county, one in Lake county, and five in Klamath, all in Langell valley. This paradox, brought about by the changing of county lines (Lake county having been separated from Jackson in 1874, and Klamath from Lake in 1882), was repeated in other pioneer families."

After pioneering in the Langell valley country, the Wilsons moved to Central Point where Mr. Wilson died some 10 years ago. He is credited with carrying the message to Yreka, Calif., when the Indians capitulated at the close of the Modoc war.

Mrs. Mary Wilson Goddard, 1563 Hope, left Monday for Central Point to attend final rites for her mother-in-law.

Which Baptism Is Valid Today?

The New Testament mentions five baptisms: the baptism of John, the baptism of the Holy Spirit, the baptism of fire, the baptism of suffering, and the baptism of the commission. How can we know which baptism we are to receive today? Paul said in Eph. 4:4 "There is one Lord, one faith and one baptism." Since there is only one baptism, we want to be certain which it is.

John's baptism was for Israel and not for the Gentiles. (Acts 13:24). This baptism of John was only preparatory to Christ's baptism. (Acts 19:4).

The baptism of the Holy Spirit was never a command. It was a promise, and the only ones who received this baptism were the apostles at Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost, and the household of Cornelius at Caesarea Philippi. (Acts 1 and 2; Acts 10).

The baptism of fire is the punishment which shall be meted out to all unrighteous after the great judgment. (Matt. 3:12).

The baptism of suffering is that to which Jesus referred, meaning his sufferings on the cross. (Mk. 10:38).

The baptism of the commission, however, was taught and commanded by our Lord and practised by all the apostles. Matt. 28:19 says, "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptising them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." This is the baptism, and the only baptism, we are authorized by the Holy Scriptures to administer.
