

SKEEN URGES PLANNING NOW FOR VET AIDS

International President D. A. Skeen of the Lions club was principal speaker and honor guest at a dinner dance held by the local club at the Willard hotel Monday evening.

Skeen appealed to the Lions club, and to all similar organizations, to take steps now to help bring America's returning soldiers back into community life as private citizens with the least possible economic or spiritual shock.

Mayor John Houston, welcoming Skeen to Klamath Falls, made a brief address in which he said that how communities such as this discharge their war-time duties will determine whether they are worth fighting and dying for.

Skeen came here on a tour of the northwest from his home in Salt Lake City. He is a relative of Paul Skeen, president of the local club.

Clarence Humble, national councillor, presided at the meeting. In attendance was Robert M. Fischer Jr., Eugene, district governor of Lions International. A number of Lions from nearby cities, including Bend, Medford and Lakeview, attended the dinner.

U. S. 3rd Army—Captures fourth fort guarding French bastion of Metz, lengthens bridgehead over Moselle river to within 1 1/2 miles of German border, scores advances on other sections of Metz front.

U. S. 7th Army—Advances two miles in Vosges mountain area south of 3rd army front, captures several villages and smashes German counterattack southeast of Baccarat.

U. S. 1st Army—Halts counterattack in Schmidt area and advances slightly in Hurtgen forest in Germany.

Canadian 1st Army and British 2nd Army—Patrol Holland front and continue artillery duel with nazis across Maas river.

Kitchens Become Tin Mines For War Items

Women of Klamath county can "mine" tin sufficient for 136 Flying Fortresses this year.

These figures were compiled by J. A. Stewart, vice president of the American Can company, on the basis of canned foods consumed by civilians in the county during 1943. On the basis of last year's consumption, civilians will open 3,280,260 cans of food this year, he said. According to a table recently issued by Washington, 24,000 cans provide tin sufficient for one Flying Fortress.

Portland Cannery Workers Vote Strike

PORTLAND, Nov. 14 (AP)—AFL cannery workers here have threatened a walkout protesting delay in receiving wage increases granted by the WLB.

The wage stabilization board is studying the wage increase. Officials of the two canneries involved, Libby, McNeil and Libby, and Starr Fruit Products, filed an appeal, claiming they could not increase wages unless ceiling prices were lifted.

Workers voted to walk out Saturday but postponed action for a few days.

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REGISTRATION TIME ENDS FOR LANDLORDS

Close of business tomorrow marks the end of the 45-day period of grace for registering rentals under the office of price administration rent control program, Marvin Hixon, examiner for the Klamath Falls defense-rental area, warned landlords today.

More than 3100 dwellings of all types are already in the records, but there are still many landlords, particularly those operating "first rentals" and

Although registrations will continue to be accepted after tomorrow's deadline, Hixon today pointed out the risks the landlord runs who enters the OPA records late.

Non-registration during the 45-day period is a violation of the rent regulations and leaves the property owner vulnerable when OPA compliance officers begin checking into the area.

"Action on any complaints of

overcharging, frequently depends on whether the violation is willful. Unwillful violations may result in refunds and, in some cases, in payment of \$25 to \$50 in OPA administrator's claims. But willful violations seldom are settled with simple refunds. More often they draw the \$25 or \$50 penalty, and failure to register is the first evidence of willfulness when a case is brought to the test," Hixon explained.
