

SOLDIERS WIN THREE FORTS GUARDING CITY

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their headon thrust toward Metz from the west, a dispatch from supreme headquarters said. A German broadcast earlier had said the Americans had opened assault on Briant which the enemy successfully defended against a thrust two months ago and Jeanne D'Arc.

Immediately south of Metz, American troops which captured Forts L'Alsne and L'Yser, were driving toward Magny less than a mile from the city, after capturing Pouilly and the ridge of the same name. East of this point, other Americans seized Peltre, 21 miles southeast of Metz. German resistance in this area was reported stiffening.

Storm Morhange

Twenty-three miles southeast of Metz Yanks stormed Morhange and the fourth armored division rolled toward Bemerins. The 26th infantry division captured Marsal, 20 miles east of Nancy.

A field dispatch tonight said the Germans had thrown heavy but futile counterattacks against the 90th and 95th divisions in their advance southeastward from the Thionville area, but AP Correspondent Lewis Hawkins said it was still not clear whether the Germans planned an all-out defense of Metz.

Warden Asks End of Fight Over Reclamation Projects

DENVER, Nov. 15 (AP)—O. S. Warden of Great Falls Mont., president of the National Reclamation association, today called for an end of the "present non-stop conflict" in Washington over reclamation projects.

In a speech prepared for the opening of the association's 13th annual meeting, he suggested that "if no one else will tackle a long-delayed task," the organization should write a statute defining the functions of each federal agency working on development of land and water resources.

Warden, who is publisher of a Great Falls newspaper, proposed that the army engineers and the departments of interior and agriculture be compelled "to harmonize their differences in advance of attempted legislation."

Time to Catch Up
Contending that the engineers of the army and U. S. bureau of reclamation are "far ahead" of legislation on reclamation, Warden declared that "it is time for the congress to catch up."

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northerly from Portland and between Eldorado and the Southern Pacific railroad.

Prevent Speculation
The commission would like to see this done, the letter stated, to "prevent any speculation on property should it seem feasible to make this landing strip development."

Phil Hitchcock, chairman of the aviation committee of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, who presented the proposition to the commission, also appeared before the council Tuesday night. Hitchcock said establishment of the strip would encourage private flying and also benefit the city. The only expense to the city, he said, would concern property, and that he felt the state highway department was interested in the establishment of the proposed strip.

Minimum length of the strip would be 3000 feet, and possibly 4000. He reviewed a movement throughout the country which will encourage establishment of landing points such as is now under consideration here.

"The legislative machinery clogs," he said, "we are losing time. We can move along faster if the congressional machinery is repaired. I think we can even raise the sights of the engineers."

"I would say that we have water enough . . . to irrigate 30,000,000 additional acres under the provisions of the reclamation act. This, then, is the immediate challenge to the National Reclamation association. There is more to do than has been done."

Plan Near Completion
Warden said there has been "an undesirable and unnecessary striving for advantage in the congress" over proposed development of the Missouri river basin. But, he added, reclamation bureau and army engineers "have so far coordinated their differences that a satisfactory unified plan can soon be submitted" to congress.

Much of the conflict over the development has arisen from competition between navigation and irrigation interests. However, Warden quoted President Roosevelt as saying in a recent letter that the Missouri river projects should be constructed so "as not to affect adversely the use of water for irrigation in the upstream states."

Synthetic Oil Plant Blasted

LONDON, Nov. 15 (AP)—A force of RAF Lancasters attacked a synthetic oil plant at Dortmund in the Ruhr today in the first operation by heavy bombers from Britain since the RAF sank the German Battleship Tirpitz last Sunday morning.

The Lancasters were escorted by fighter command Mustangs. American bombers remained grounded in Britain, but escorted forces of Liberators and Fortresses from Italy bombed targets in the region of Liz and Innsbruck in former Austria.

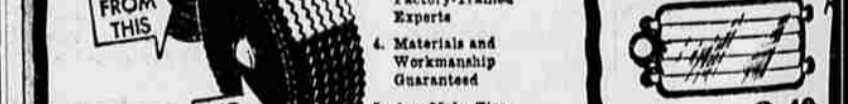
