

SEGREGATES HARVEST GRAIN, POTATOES

TULELAKE—A total of 2,551,659 pounds of vegetables was harvested on farm lands operated under jurisdiction of the WRA, according to an announcement made by officials at the Japanese segregation camp Monday. Howard Jarrett, farm superintendent stated that October saw the heaviest production of the season with 1,406,385 pounds of potatoes heading the list. Barley and oats totaled 601,120 pounds. 474 tons of alfalfa was baled for feed during the second cutting and 67 acres additional will furnish pasture for 1000 head of hogs. Harvesting operations will be completed this month, Jarrett stated.
