Rose Bowl-hungry Southern California invades Berkeley next Saturday for its second 1944 game with faltering University of California, victim of a 7 to 0 mud battle defeat by the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins last weekend.

USC's Trojans rested Saturday and are pointing to a November 28 meeting with UCLA for the final decision on the Pacific Coast conference's representative in the New Year's Day classic at Pasadena.

The Trojans and Bears tied, 6-6, the first time they met, October 7.

Out of the Rose Bowl race, Washington's Huskies take on another army club Saturday after absorbing a 28 to 0 licking at the hands of the powerful Fourth Air Force over the weekend.

UCLA prepares for the crucial game with USC by engaging College of Pacific, knocked over by San Francisco Coast Guard, 13 to 0, Saturday.

Best coast service game of the day will be the Riverside clash between Fourth Air Force and San Diego Naval Training station.

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Arky End Wins Honor As Lineman

Big Flanker Selected Best By Press Poll Due to Fine Play Against Rice Saturday

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (AP)—Mike Schumchik, Arkansas end, was picked today as the lineman of the week in the seventh weekly Associated Press poll.

Standing 6 feet 4 inches and weighing 205 pounds, Schumchik won the honor because of his outstanding play against Rice. His feats included over-coming a 10-yard lead to tackle George Wamsley, of Rice, after an 86-yard gain rushing the Rice punter so hard that the kick was blocked by another Arkansas player thus setting up the touchdown that knocked Rice out of first place in the Southwest conference. On defense he played left end. When Arkansas got the ball he switched to right end from where he made several end-around runs for good gains.

Schumchik, termed by his Coach Glen Rose the "outstanding player on the field" is the fourth end to be selected for the weekly award. Hank Walker, of Virginia; Leon Bramlett, of navy; and Jack Russell, of Randolph Field are the terminal players previously named.

Frank Lambright, Arkansas guard, and Bob "Buster" McClure, Nevada tackle, likewise stood out. Lambright scooped up a Rice fumble and ran 38 yards for a touchdown, then broke up a fourth period Rice threat by intercepting a pass.

Although Nevada lost to Fleet City (Calif.) bluejackets, McClure was all over the field in the game played during a snowstorm. Lt. J. M. Melevich, Fleet City coach, lauded McClure as "one of the finest college tackles on the west coast."

Harold Watts, Michigan center, who helped whip Illinois by recovering two Illinois fumbles, and navy's center, Jack Martin, also were praised; Ernie Knotts, Duke guard, piled up Wake Forest plays repeatedly with his great defensive play.

17 Grid Elevens Still in Running For Orange Bowl

MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 15 (AP)—Seventeen teams, eight of them from the south, are still in the running for the New Year's day Orange Bowl football game, Schedule Chairman C. F. Jack Baldwin said Monday.

They are Tennessee, Mississippi State, Georgia Tech, Alabama, Duke, Georgia, Wake Forest and Virginia from the south; Tulsa, Oklahoma A. & M., Texas, TCU, Texas A. & M. and Arkansas from the southwest; Michigan State and Iowa State from the midwest and Holy Cross from the east.

Ortiz Retains Title With TKO In Ninth Canto

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 15 (AP)—Little Manuel Ortiz, the farmer from El Centro, Calif., retained his world bantamweight championship today by virtue of a plucky rally in the third round of a scheduled 15-round battle with Luis Castillo of Mexico City.

Once under way, Ortiz turned on a stream of right crosses and uppercuts that flowed straight to a technical knock-out in the ninth. Their slugging match last night was the titleholder's twelfth defense of his crown, and his second victory over Castillo by the T.K.O. route.

Ortiz rallied after being floored for a no-count in the second, and won every round from the third to the ninth. Castillo went to the canvas in the sixth and ninth, but came up without a count.

PGA Aim---Golf Course For Every Military Hospital

CHICAGO, Nov. 15 (AP)—Ed Dudley of the Broadmoor Country Club, Atlantic City, N. J., yesterday was elected to his fourth term as president of the Professional Golfers association, holding its 28th convention.

Frank Sprongell of Kent Country Club, Grand Rapids, Mich., was reelected secretary, and Willie Maguire, Houston, Tex., Country Club was reelected treasurer.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15 (AP)—A golf course for every military hospital in the United States is the aim of the Professional Golfers association.

Impressed with a report on the value of the sport in reconditioning of hospitalized servicemen, the PGA unanimously approved the plan and dedicated its 28th annual convention to the project which will extend throughout the nation.

The association already has participated in construction of a number of courses at government hospitals, and it was success of these enterprises prompted PGA's approval of the project at closing sessions of the convention yesterday.

"The PGA now will seek approval of the surgeon general and the war department program, and hopes to have members placed in charge of the project," PGA secretary Frank Sprongell of Grand Rapids, Mich., PGA secretary, explained that courses to be constructed naturally would fit available space.

"We plan to construct courses, approach and build, and depend on the circumstances," he said. "We like to have a nine-hole course at every hospital, but this is possible at present."

Funds for construction of courses would be raised by government-sponsored tournaments, equipment and subscription, he said, would be obtained in the same manner.
