Farm Production Goals Set by WFA For Record Year

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (P)—
War Food Administrator Marvin Jones called upon farmers today for another all-out production year in 1945.

Assuming continuance of the war in Europe until next summer or next fall, and consequent heavy military and lend-lease demand, Jones set production goals closely resembling 1944's.

"We must make certain," Jones sid, "that we have plenty for our armed forces, for civilians, for our allies and for relief needs.

"We cannot risk the possibility of a shortage."

Jones recommended about the same total crop acreage as planted this year, but with some changes as to individual crops.

His livestock goals call for slight increases in the number of pigs farrowed, in milk production and in beef cattle slaughtered but a 16 per cent reduction in egg production.
