At Purdue Athletic Director Guy Mackey said: "Personally I'd be glad to have the rule against post-season games lifted. However, I can't speak for the university." Dr. J. A. Estey, Purdue faculty representative, had no comment.

He said: "The Big Ten and the Pacific coast conferences have stood for everything that is best for college athletics and football in particular and such an arrangement would be for the good of college sports. 


Wildcats Clash With Notre Dame In Annual Fray
