By The Associated Press U. 8. 9th Army - Secrecy which cloaked its operations for months was dropped to-day and it was disclosed to be operating in Holland un-der Lt. Gen. William H.



His widow, Elsle, a son, David W., three brothers and a sister survive. Farrell to Ask Extension of Motor Drivers' Licenses

SALEM, Nov. 16 (P) - Secre-tary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr., said today he would ask the legislature to extend motor ve-hicle drivers licenses for anoth-er two years. The licenses originally were to have expired in 1943, but the legislature extended them. Far-rell said the revenue is not need-ed, and that his office lacks suf-ficient help to mail out new ones.

CORVALLIS, Nov. 16 (P) — GI's overseas were sent 40,612 tin cans of food as Christmas treats from Oregon, the Oregon State college extension service reported today. Fruit cakes, hard candles, nuts, fudge, cookles, coffee and cheese were scaled into the cans at county extension offices as a special service. Benton county sent the most cans— 7698; Linn was next with 6042; then Jackson, with 5556.


