'Simplified' Withholding Rate to Become Effective

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Some 30,000,000 wage and salary earners were reminded by the internal revenue bureau today that the rate of withholding from their pay will change January 1.

Under the tax simplification law passed this spring, the withholding rates were adjusted to collect the entire tax of persons with wages and salaries under \$5000.

Under the old law withholdings were calculated to take only the approximate tax, leaving a year end adjustment to be made.

A table showing simple weekly withholdings to become effective when the new rates apply, January 1, follows:

In most cases the new withholding will take slightly more from the pay envelope and salary checks than does the present levy. However, it is difficult to compare the old and new tables, because the old method collected the same amount of salaries within \$5 brackets,

whereas the new system collects on specific dollar levels up to \$60 weekly.

Board to Visit State Institutions

SALEM, Nov. 16 (AP)—The state board of control said today it would visit each state institution before approving institution budgets and their building programs for the biennium beginning next July 1.

Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr., said he would propose that money be borrowed from some dormant state fund to provide an extensive building program for the state hospital. This money would be repaid by fees paid by relatives of some inmates.

31 INCHES OF SNOW REPORTED AT LAKE

T. C. Parker, assistant superintendent of Crater Lake national park, has moved his office to winter headquarters in the federal building.

Parker stated that recent snowstorms at Crater lake gave the park 31 inches of new snow. Up until Thursday, the road from the south entrance to the park headquarters has been kept open, said Parker, and Chief Ranger Clyde Gilbert has been staying with the new caretaker, who will remain in the park all winter.

Gilbert will leave the park Thursday or Friday, however, and the roads will then be allowed to snow in for the rest of the winter. Gilbert will make regular monthly ski trips this winter for a snow survey and to inspect park buildings and property, according to Parker.

America Needs Strong Merchant Marine, Asserts Rethmeyer

PORTLAND, Nov. 16 (AP)—America needs a strong merchant marine for postwar economic and military security and to avoid another depression, H. G. Rethmeyer, Seattle marine representative of a national manufacturing company, said here last night.

Rethmeyer asserted that broad expanses of ocean can no longer be counted upon to give the country time to build up a merchant marine for another global war.
