

QUICK START ON FLOOD CONTROL EYED

DENVER, Nov. 17 (AP)—Army engineers are ready to let contracts for about \$63,000,000 worth of flood control projects in 17 western states so that a quick start on construction may be made as soon as peace comes, the Gen. Eugene Roybold, chief of the engineers, reported today. He told the National Reclamation association in a prepared speech that the corps' program provides for boosting this "back-log of ready-to-go projects" to \$230,000,000 by June, 1945; to \$305,000,000 by the end of 1945, and to \$350,000,000 by June, 1946.

Ora Bundy of Ogden, Utah, former first vice president of the association, was named president at a meeting of the board of directors last night. He succeeds O. S. Warden of Great Falls, Mont., who had asked that he be permitted to resign from the office he held since 1935.

Roybold advised the delegates that "practically all the large dams of the future may be expected to be of the multiple-purpose type."
"If the primary purpose of a given dam is flood control or navigation," he said, "undoubtedly it will be built by the engineers. But if its primary purpose is irrigation, with incidental benefits to flood control and navigation, it will be built by the U. S. reclamation service."

Advent of a third and new era of reclamation—that of basin-wide developments—was predicted in another prepared speech by William E. Warne of Washington, assistant commissioner of the reclamation bureau.

He described the first era as the development of simple diversions and the patchwork irrigation of bottomlands and the second as the construction of multiple-purpose projects.

Safety Program to Cover Schools Here

All elementary schools, as well as the high school in Klamath Falls, are being covered by a safety program sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as a part of their program in Traffic Safety Week.

An assembly was given Friday morning for juniors and seniors at KUHHS and another for freshmen and sophomores in the afternoon. At the meetings were special movies, and short talks for the purpose of impressing the importance of Safety Week upon the students.

Those who took part in the assemblies were Mayor John Houston, E. P. Lee, president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, John Sandmeyer, chairman of the Klamath Traffic Safety Council, Adam Lafor, field representative, Sidney King, director of safety division in the office of secretary of state, and representative of Earl Heuvel, chief of police.

Two window displays are being shown as part of this program—one in J. C. Penney's, and the other at the U. S. National Bank.

Dove Trees Auctioned For Convention Fund
