Today's Roundup

NOT much has been said here recently about the local housing situation. It probably isn't news today to report that it isn't getting any better, nor are the prospects for early improvement very bright.



Newcomers, especially military people, are still hunting desperately for quarters in town. We talked to a man this morning whose experience may be regarded as typical. An officer who served long overseas with the marines, he returned three weeks ago from the Pacific, reported here and then left for the east and south on his 30-day leave.

He joined his family—wife and two children—whom he had not seen for a long time. They shipped their household goods to Klamath Falls, and the four of them arrived a few days ago. Since then, they have been on the hunt for a house or apartment, thus far without success.

They are in a situation, and there are many of them. These men, back from long absence in which they have faced things most of us know nothing about, want and have a right to live with their families. Many of the single men may be expected to marry the sweethearts who have waited for them. Klamath Falls is the city to which they are bringing their families.

Permanent Personnel
THIS situation promises to be further complicated by the establishment of permanent personnel at the Marine Barracks. This will include a considerable number of officers and men, and because of their permanent status a larger-than-usual percentage of them will be looking for family quarters. Meanwhile, the Marine Barracks is being expanded.

On the other side, we have the 80 housing units to be built for families of navy and marine personnel on the former school site at the south edge of the city. Bids are being opened in a few days on this project. This will help relieve the shortage, but it appears inadequate and furthermore, experience has shown that such housing does not rise in a few weeks. It took many months to get 40 units of row housing built here, and that is the only additional housing brought to Klamath Falls since the military installations opened.

What Can You Do?
MEANWHILE, local people who have any sort of suitable quarters which they can rent to military personnel are urged to list these quarters with the chamber of commerce course, the trainees will be assigned to government airway communication stations for a period of "on the job" training.

The Civil Aeronautics administration is recruiting a class of 35 aircraft communication trainees to convene at Seattle, Wash., on November 20. Applicants who are accepted will receive a salary during six weeks of classroom training at Seattle.

Upon completion of this course, the trainees will be assigned to government airway communication stations for a period of "on the job" training. In order to qualify for this position, applicants must be between the ages of 18 to 30, of either sex, able to type 30 words per minute, and either two years of college or experience in aeronautics or communications.

News Behind the News

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17—Mr. Churchill's estimate of six months for the end of the war in Europe is generally accepted here, although no official has said anything about it, having grown tired of guessing.

The weather has been of a kind this far which would discourage even an optimist. It is what the British, with characteristic understatement, called wretched.

True, the Patton drive is meeting with success, but the nature of it, as far as developed, plainly indicates its limited objectives which are the Metz forts. With good fortune it will merely approach the Siegfried line at that point and still be a long way from the Saar valley, which is the source of coal and iron for the war industries.

You can take your pick of the rumors about Hitler being in the bughouse, hospital, in hiding, at his supposedly favorite phobia, chewing rugs, or any of the other second-hand stories out of Germany except the official explanation handed out by the German news agency as an excuse for the Himmler special broadcast—the one that Hitler was too busy to speak.

In case anyone is cuddled up under the bed in fear of the German rocket gun, which the war department officially announced just before election might soon hit these shores, he can come out now. The statement was in the nature of a warning, just to get officialdom on record in case anything along that line did occur, but actually the possibility of any real damage to us from that source is remote.

300-Mile Radius

IT is true enough the V-2 now has a radius of about 300 miles and there is no known scientific impediment to prevent the expansion of this radius up to 3000 miles eventually. But this ordinarily would require years of development, and anyway the war department was not speaking of this vague future possibility; years distant may be never.

The official statement relates to present-day rocket radius possibilities and said the bombs would have to be launched from submarines or ships. Germany has a few submarines left, but most of the docks for them are gone and a submarine could hardly carry more than one or two of these larger-type bombs. A large-scale attack from these is impossible.

As for an attack by surface ships, the United Nations control the ocean and it would be difficult if not impossible for a surface vessel to get out of a German harbor and approach these shores without detection. Certainly no large-scale fleet attack is within the realm of any current imagination.

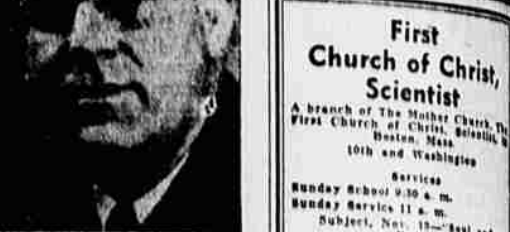
