Mill buying to cover flour sales to the army caused wheat to rally to yesterday's closing levels.  
Corn recovered quickly when commission houses readily took the offerings of cash dealers and local operators.  
Shorts were the best buyers of rye futures. The trade in oats was mixed.  
At the close wheat was unchanged to 1/2 cent lower than yesterday's finish, December \$1.65. Corn was 1/2 to 1/4 cent higher, December \$1.07 1/2. Oats were unchanged to 1/2 cent lower, December \$1.04. Rye was off 1/2 to 1/4 cent, December \$1.07 1/2. Barley was unchanged to 1/2 cent lower, December \$1.05.
