FRENCH BRIDGE RHINE; YANKS HIT INTO SAAR

Resistance In Metz Collapses Rapidly

LONDON, Nov. 20 (P)—
French troops were reported throwing bridges across the Rhine near the Swiss border and American armor struck into the rich industrial Saar for the first time today in two new invasions of Germany.

Resistance in the old Roman fortress city of Metz collapsed rapidly as Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's third army infantry overran three-fourths of the town and captured the SS commander.

While the 10th armored division of Patton's armor rumbled two miles over the Saar border toward Merzig, other troops threatened new thrusts into Hitler land.

Battles Rage
Fighting continued only in the northern and southern tips of Metz after eight doughboys kick-

ing within 750 miles of Tokyo, and, sanup of Saipan netted 248 Japa.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur gave a breakdown of American casualties in the first month of the central Philippines campaign showing 1133 killed, 126 missing and 4432 wounded.

His figure of more than 45, 000 Japanese killed or wounded did not include 8000 believed abroad four transports and six destroyers sunk off Ormoc bay on November 10 as American carrier planes broke up a large scale enemy reinforcement try.

Added Casualties

Nor did they include Japanese naval personnel lost during the crushing defeat of the Imperial fleet in Philippine waters October 25.

MacArthur credited the destruction wrought by his long range artillery and the strategic enemy in such an overwhelming ratio.
