No Inquest
Sheriff John Sharp of Alturas, and acting coroner of Modoc county, was called to the scene. He stated that no inquest would be necessary as he considered the affair accidental.

Torrential rains still slowed all Leyte operations. Landings in the Asia Islands, 130 miles north of Soerung, New Guinea, presumably will knock out Japanese lookout stations used to spot American bombing flights for northward targets. The Mapia islands evidently were taken for this reason.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's three-army spearhead, slanted northeast of Aachen into the Rhineland, battered out another mile into Wonnau, at the northern fringe of the Harigen forest six miles west of Duren and 26 miles from Cologne.

U. S. 7th Army—Captures 35 towns in drive through Vosges mountain passes in France.
U. S. 1st and 9th Armies and Part of British 2nd Army—Throws armor, artillery and aerial power into gigantic battle northeast of Aachen, aimed at breaking through to Cologne.
British 2nd Army Units—Reaches within 2 1/2 miles of German border below Venlo on Holland front.

45,000 Japs have been killed and wounded on Leyte as compared with our killed and wounded total of 5601—a ratio of eight to one in our favor.

This refers to Jap LAND losses only. It doesn't include their sea losses in the big naval battle or in their attempts to land reinforcements on Leyte.

They're still counter-attacking viciously at Ormoc. So far, we've been able to throw back all their attacks. They're using small boats and barges to bring in reinforcements. We're smashing their boats.

It's a hard fight and will continue so. If the Japs lose the Philippines, their island empire will be pretty well shot.

THERE has been a shakeup in Chungking—big enough to include eight cabinet posts. All "circles" in Chungking are said to welcome it, but some are quoted as thinking it may not have gone far enough. The important question seems to be whether the changes are FOREIGN RUNNERS OF OTHERS and whether they are leading toward a compromise between the Chungking government and the Chinese communists. The communist question seems all-important in the Chinese situation.

Among other changes, there is a new minister of information—which means a NEW CENSOR.

ONE interesting bit of news leaked out over the weekend. We're building an oil pipeline from India to interior China. If we can get an oil pipeline across the Himalayas, we'll be able to SUPPLY OUR AIR FORCES in China.

That would be important.
