

# PILOT BLASTS HOPE'S 'FILTH' IN EDITORIAL

CHICAGO, Nov. 20 (AP)—Comedian Bob Hope says he is "astounded" and "amazed" by the editorial in the Pilot, official publication of the Catholic archdiocese of Boston, which urged "our entertainers not to make 'our' men in uniform" laugh "at the wrong things."

"My record of entertaining service men and women speaks for itself," Hope said today after reading excerpts of the editorial. "An Open Letter to a Radio Man" which said: "Does it mean nothing to Mr. Hope that some soldiers, because of 'moral building programs, may face their God unprepared for the reckoning?'"

"I'm concerned about the editorial—but not worried," Hope said, adding that he had made overseas trips and entertained at every army and navy camp in the country—"trying to cheer up more than six million of our servicemen—trying to give them a laugh."

"There's never been any criticism of my shows by military authorities, religious groups or the service men themselves. On the contrary, I've won the congratulations and expressions of good will for my military efforts from military officials and chaplains of every faith."

The Pilot's editorial offered the radio star its "admiration and heart-felt thank you" for his sacrifices in behalf of the men who have given their all for our country, but added:

"Some of the men who hear the comedian's artful filth, whose minds recur to it afterward, who act out its innuendoes, are going to die. The church has no invocation against sudden death. But she does have an incessant and very earnest prayer against a sudden and unprovided death."

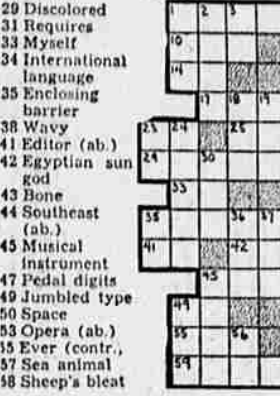

is understood that any bond which has been purchased during the month of November will apply to the quota.

It is the fervent hope of the executive chairman, Ray Harlan and Cleve Snider, that the full county quota be raised during the first week of the drive, which, if accomplished, will put Lake county among the first to raise their allotted quotas in the state. If this can be accomplished it will relieve the bond committees considerably, in that second calls or contacts will be eliminated.

At the bond drive dinner held at Hotel Lakeview last Friday noon, it was brought out by Burt K. Snider, who is in charge of raising the farm quota of \$150,000 for the county, and who is also a member of the state farm war drive committee, whose quota is \$12,000,000, that farmers will be able to buy more bonds than in the other drives as the drive comes more opportunely for them. He also explained that farmers can estimate their taxes fairly close and purchase "C" tax notes now and use them to pay their taxes with later. They will apply on the quota just the same as bonds and they can be kept the same as bonds. Snider also emphasized the fact that people do not need to fear the security of bonds for they are backed and endorsed by the U. S. govern-

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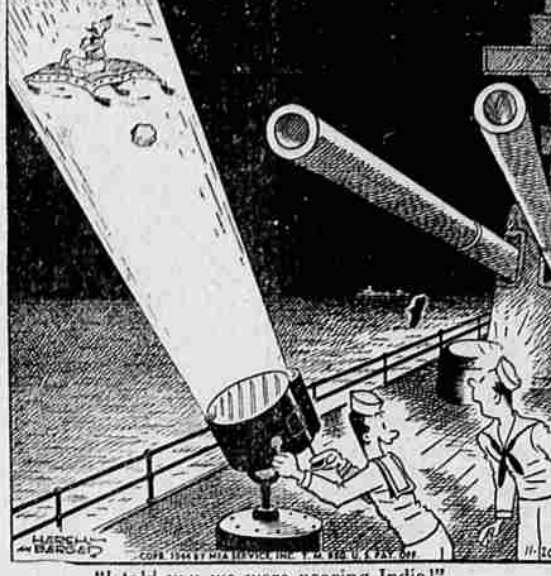

For example, during the month of September for Oregon, there were 18 traffic fatalities, of which only two were accidents involving two or more vehicles. Nine deaths were caused by crashes involving only one vehicle; five deaths were non-collision accidents, and the remaining two were collision involving a vehicle and a fixed object.

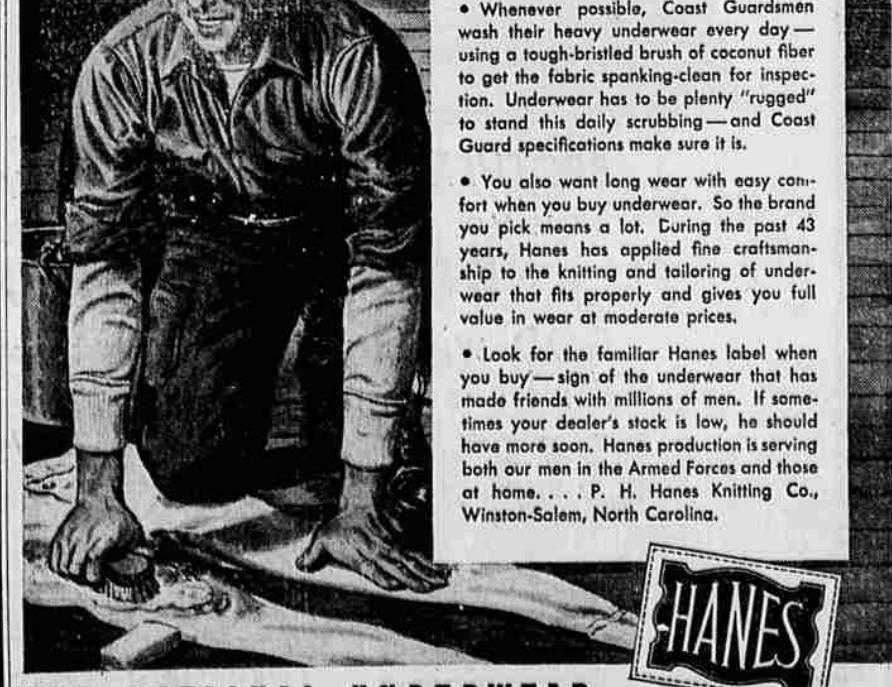
