News Behind the News

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21—George Bernard Shaw has set forth upon the front pages his conception of the coming world which seems to be about halfway back to Methuselah and halfway ahead to Superman.

It is to be a place where somewhat savage ideas prevail. Indeed he thinks that time already has arrived when women get their men "like the Danakils," the Ethiopian tribe in which he says the males were required to show four scalps on their belts before being considered for mating.

Mr. Shaw must have seen some unusual women lately, as those requirements do not seem to be in effect around here.

The important and disturbing dream of Mr. Shaw's future world political mating has equalled great dramatic possibilities for a play but is equally unrealistic. He conjures up a sphere dominated apparently by communistic ideals and Catholic ideals, but with the communistic ideals obviously dominant because man is to work for the state, or at least not be guided by any democratic theories.

This all seems to be somewhat confused in Mr. Shaw's mind, but essentially what he wants, or thinks is coming, is a super-world state.

No Super State

The best official eyes here or at least those sharp enough and close enough to the situation to see everything going on inside have failed to discern anything like that kind of a world in immediate prospect. There will be no super state in the coming peace. You may be sure of that.

The resistance here to the merging of sovereignties is evident in state department policies, and really has not been brought up seriously since Mr. Wallace tried out the same vague idea so unsuccessfully in some speeches a year or two back advocating a peace that would take us halfway to communist and bring communism halfway to us.

Also Mr. Shaw does not seem to have read Mr. Roosevelt's campaign speeches, pledging himself to free enterprise and the democratic system, which has done about as well in this war as any other, since it is supplying the world and producing the wherewithal of victory.

The philosophic Mr. Shaw evidently is looking at the matter the way most communists

and radicals seem to see it without recognizing the superior job democracy has done and can do.

Correct Discernment

But Mr. Shaw has presented at least a correct discernment of the forces evident behind the news of current international developments. He speaks of both Catholicism and communism in the philosophic sense that Christian idealism springs from the Bible as the opposing communist ideal springs from Marx.

Incompatible Factors

He has merely overlooked the fact that the Bible, in its philosophic essence, also represents the democratic ideal of the individuality of the human soul, of the personal being of a man, and it is not compatible with his enslavement to the state—as in fact, Marx himself recognized in his characterization of all religion as a hope for the minds of the people.

These two ideals are just as far apart as the savagery Shaw mentioned in relation to mating as he calls it, and marriage as the Bible conceives it to be. You cannot compromise them in statecraft any more than in the social relationship between men and women.

Hitler who borrowed most of his fascism from communistic theories also conceived marriage to be a relationship to be encouraged primarily in the interest of the state.

Christianity conceives marriage to be an individual compact primarily for the good of the individuals involved in their human relation to God. But even from a non-religious standpoint, marriage is justified by natural law. It has proved over many thousands of years to furnish the best way to raise children, mere mating hardly offers the required permanent and serious guidance, or encourages parental responsibility.

The Marxian-Hitler and communist philosophies recognized this also by trying to supplant the lack of individual parental discipline with discipline by the state.

Mr. Shaw obviously is still a dramatist, and has taken his customary long stretched license with realism.

The War Today

We are taking our text today from the Eisenhower communique which says that allied troops on the Cologne plain east of captured Gellenkirchen "are meeting fierce enemy resistance."

With cities, towns and hamlets falling like tennpins in various sectors, and allied forces making sensational advances, we are in danger of slipping into the over-optimistic class again. Mind you, optimism is warranted, for things are going well, but we shall be smart to stick with facts—a plague on 'em.

The Gellenkirchen-Aachen sector opposite Cologne and Germany's all-impairing Ruhr industrial center, is the crucial zone at the moment along the erupting 400 mile battle-front. General Ike is employing great striking power there in an effort to break through to the Rhine, and naturally that's where the nazis have concentrated all the strength they can spare from their depleted forces.

Most Promising Route

Of course, this doesn't necessarily mean the allies won't achieve a breakthrough at some other point or points. However, it's the most promising route into Hitlerdom and as such is being exploited.

Now in order to meet the terrific pressure on this strategic sector the nazis have been compelled to withdraw troops and equipment from other sectors which are less vital. They just haven't the soldiers to man their entire front adequately, and many of the forces which they do have are scrapings of their man-power and are being sacrificed as cannon fodder.

This shifting of German troops was exactly what Eisenhower figured on, and his army commanders are taking advantage of his successful tactics. Thus we see spectacular allied gains at points which we had come to regard as inland Gibraltar, and in fact would be if held in full strength.

Forced to Retreat

The nazis have been forced to fall back at numerous places, abandoning powerful positions—and that's the point I want to make. Some of the sensational allied gains have been due in part to the fact that the enemy was retreating to fresh defenses.

That in no way detracts from the magnificent work done by the pursuing allies, for it has taken bloody fighting and superb leadership to oust the Germans from these strongholds and drive them into retreat. However, we should recognize that he who runs away lives to fight another day, and the nazis who are retreating still must be dealt with further back. Let's not get into the frame of mind of some folk back at the time of the German retreat from Normandy, when wishful thinkers were saying the war would be over in three weeks.

CHICAGO, Nov. 21 (AP)—Grain prices were irregular in the futures trade today, advancing during the early part of the session only to decline under the pressure of profit taking. Just before the close the strength of corn caused other markets to rally slightly. The trade was light in all pits. Purchases of corn by cash grain houses was a feature of the late trade and prices hit new highs for the day shortly before the close.

The rice market was nervous. Wheat held within a narrow range. At the close wheat was unchanged to one cent higher than yesterday's finish, total December \$1.65. Corn was up 1/4 to 1/2 cent, December 65c. Rye was 1/4 to 1/2 cent higher, December \$1.08 1/2. Barley was unchanged to 1/2 cent higher, December \$1.00.

Passenger Trains Collide On Bridge

MEMPHIS, Nov. 21 (AP)—Two outbound passenger trains collided today on the Harahan bridge which spans the Mississippi river but none of the passengers was injured seriously and damage to the trains was slight. The Missouri Pacific said its train bound for Hot Springs,

Ark., crashed into the rear of the Rock Island's local en route to Helena, Ark. The Missouri Pacific normally carries eight or nine passenger cars while the Rock Island carries about three.

A Press-Scimitar photographer said the rear Rock Island car was damaged only slightly and none of the passengers was injured.

The accident occurred on the Arkansas side of the bridge. Police reported a fog over the river at the time of the accident.
