Folkes Morose On Hearing of Refusal To Review Case

SALEM, Nov. 21 (AP)—Robert E. Lee Folkes, young negro cook under death sentence for the slaying of Mrs. Martha Virginia James, lost his composure yesterday when Deputy Prison Warden E. C. Halley told him the United States supreme court had refused to review his case.

Halley said that until yesterday, Folkes "made lots of wise-cracks and walked around his cell," confident he would be saved from the gas chamber.

"But now he just sits on his bed. He isn't interested in wise-cracks and walking any more," Halley added.

Folkes' only hope is for Governor Earl Snell to commute his sentence. Mrs. James was slain, her throat cut, on January 23, 1943, while she was sleeping in her berth on the Southern Pacific's Portland-Los Angeles west coast limited as it sped through Linn county.

Thanksgiving Play Slated At Mills
