Home salted nuts should be on every Thanksgiving table this year because there is such a large supply of them . . . and because it really takes very little of the homemaker's time. Although they are probably best fried in deep fat, the fat shortage will cause many homemakers to roast her almonds and peanuts by the oven or frying pan method.

Almonds should be blanched before frying that is, immersed in boiling water, and then just simmered for three minutes. The skins will then come off easily when pressed with thumb and forefinger. Then add two teaspoons of cooking oil or melted vegetables or table fat and one teaspoon salt to each cup of nutmeats. Place in a frying pan over a low heat, stirring constantly until hot through.




