THE DALLES, Nov. 22 (AP)—A walkout involving 50 employees of the Union Mills company here was reported today.

The walkout, according to company heads and officials of the American Federation of Grain Processors, flour and cereal workers, resulted from a dispute over the negotiation of a master contract.

INVESTIGATION OF PRESS TALK ASKED

OTTAWA, Nov. 22 (AP)—Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton, defense minister, has asked a full investigation of a Vancouver press conference at which officers of the Canadian army's sixth division expressed doubt over the feasibility of Canada's system of voluntary overseas service for draftees.

This development came today as the Canadian parliament met to hear the government's explanation of circumstances surrounding the resignation November 2 of Defense Minister J. L. Raiston, made in protest against the government's conscription policy.

McNaughton, former commander of the Canadian army, was appointed to succeed Raiston.

McNaughton has sent a letter to Pacific coast army commanders asking about the interviews, which occurred two days ago, it was said. He was represented as having the view that press interviews by officers on matters of policy are a breach of military discipline subject to court martial.

The sixth division officers were quoted as saying that they did not believe overseas troops can be reinforced adequately through any volunteer plan.

Logging Congress Shifted to Seaside

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 22 (AP)—The 1945 meeting of the Pacific logging congress, originally scheduled for Portland January 10, 11 and 12, has been shifted to Seaside, Ore. A. Wisnart, secretary, announced here today. There will be no change in dates.

The meeting which will bring together approximately 1000 logging superintendents and engineers of the western states and British Columbia, was transferred after a request that large meetings be not held in congested production areas on the west coast until after the war.

No Cancellation of Ship Program Planned

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 22 (AP)—A U. S. maritime commission official told 150 war contractors here yesterday that no cancellation of the Pacific coast ship-building program is in prospect.

L. T. McCarthy said the few maritime commission contracts terminated are due "to deletions from the bill of materials and changes in design, and not to cancellation of ships."

He spoke at a government-sponsored meeting on settlement of war contracts and conversion to peacetime production.

U. S. 7th Army — Punched closer to Strasbourg on Rhine, aiding the French 1st army to the south to erase the former German front along the Vosges mountains.

U. S. 3rd Army — Ends last resistance in Metz and throws back German counterattack beyond Saar frontier.

U. S. 1st and 9th Armies and Part of British 2nd Army — Penetrate forward painfully against fierce resistance in Aachen sector.

British 2nd Army Units — Battered Baarlo, only four miles from Dutch border city of Venlo.

It is hoped that the people of Klamath Falls will support the headquarters, and the marines who are giving their time in helping with this vital drive, Adams said.

McDANIELS GETS STAR For gallantry in action in France, 1st Lt. Lynn L. McDaniels, husband of Mrs. Margaret M. McDaniels of 737 No. 8th, has been awarded the Silver Star.

At the time of the action Lt. McDaniels was a reconnaissance platoon leader in a tank destroyer unit with the second armored division in France.

The citation reads: "At about 1500 hours on August 19, in the vicinity of Pullay, France, the advance was held up by artillery fire, believed to be observed fire. The weather was clear, allowing excellent observation."

"High explosive shells were fired into a tower and its vicinity where it was suspected observers were located. Evidently the fire was ineffective since enemy artillery fire continued. The infantrymen were unable to locate and wipe out the observers because of machine gun fire."

"Lt. McDaniels volunteered to lead a patrol forward through enemy lines to locate the machine guns and observers, and then direct the fire of tank destroyer guns. He went forward with two enlisted men and located the machine guns but was seriously wounded in the leg by enemy machinegun fire before he could return to the gun position."

"Lt. McDaniels was evacuated to the gun position by two medical aid men and he then gave the location of the enemy guns to the tank destroyer gun com-

manders. Fire was placed on the designated spot and the enemy artillery fire ceased, allowing the advance to proceed."

MISS MINATO TO TRAIN Advanced training at the WAVES Yeoman School, Oklahoma A. & M. Stillwater, Oklahoma, has been awarded Gina Palma Minato, S 2/c in the WAVES, yesterday reported Recruiting Specialist D. T. Schreiber.

Mrs. Minato, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Minato of Chillicothe, received the rating of seaman, second class, on completion of basic training and indoctrination at the Naval Training school for WAVES, New York City.

She received the selection for advance work at the U. S. Naval Training school as a result of her experience as clerk with the Southern Pacific company at Chillicothe, prior to volunteering for enlistment in the WAVES. On completion of advance instruction, she will be sent to a U. S. naval base, releasing a man for duty at an advance base or on a fighting ship.

Miss Minato is a graduate of Chillicothe high school. Her brother, Cpl. Alfeo E. Minato, is serving in the army air force in Casper, Wyoming.

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PRESS TO DEMAND POSTWAR FREEDOM

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (AP)—News-gathering organizations will demand that a peace treaty at the end of the war "include a provision guaranteeing worldwide freedom of the press," Kent Cooper, executive director of The Associated Press, declares.

Speaking on a broadcast over NBC last night in connection with an adaptation of his book, "Barriers Down," Cooper said: "It is my deep conviction that unless we guarantee the freedom of the press throughout the world, the next generation will be fighting World War III."

Cooper said he regarded "the barriers that were placed in the way of those who wanted a completely unhampered world news service, as barriers to world peace" and added, "I'm happy to point out tonight the ideal of unhampered news-gathering and news dissemination appealed to people in the United States."
