Operation—Will Orso, 12, son of E. B. Orso of route 3, underwent major surgery at Hillside hospital November 18.

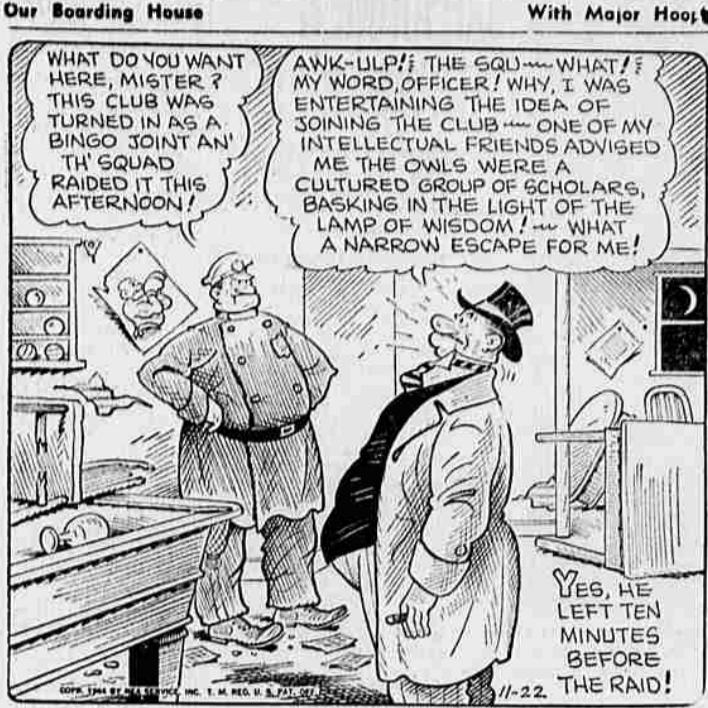
