

DO DWELLING UNITS REGISTERED

Over 3200 dwelling units were registered at the local rent control office at the close of the registration period on November 15, reports Marjorie Nixon, area rent examiner. Through the official filing period has ended, registrations are being accepted. Delinquent rents are urged to register immediately to avoid penalties.

Actual eviction cases have been referred to the rent control office. Questions regarding evictions should be referred to the office or to an attorney.

Backs of rents to the level, October 1, became effective October 1, this year. Rent ceilings have been established during the normal period of October. Rent regulation does not apply to rents on value or attempt to raise rents, but instead states rents, using the freeze principle.

Adjustment of maximum rents permitted by rent regulations in cases where material changes have been made to the property, which definitely increase its rental value. Landlords must petition the rent director to obtain an order adjusting an adjustment before setting the new rent.

JUDY WON'T WORK, BY STORE'S REQUEST

CHICAGO, Nov. 22 (AP)—By request of the management, Judy, a 3000-pound elephant won't keep her scheduled appointment today at a State street department store autographing books.

Judy, who is 12 and temperamental, went on a sit-down in the Marshall Field and company store yesterday for five hours, refusing to leave the third floor in a freight-elevator—which was the way she arrived in the book section to play her role of autographing copies of a book about an "elegant" elephant. Using a rubber hand stamp which she held in her trunk, Judy went through her job without a hitch.

When she balked on entering the elevator—apparently remembering and disliking her up-lift, harassed store officials called the Brookfield zoo. Then they ordered a crew of carpenters to build ramps—three stories of 'em for the fire stairs. A half bale of hay and bread was brought to keep Judy in good humor.

Five hours after her scheduled exit Judy stepped onto the ramp and walked down to the street—in three minutes. Then she walked proudly south on State street, startling many of the theatre and night life crowd, to her temporary headquarters in a store room. She'll probably go back to her circus headquarters in Sheboygan, Wis., today.
